FOUNDING VISION STATEMENT

California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) is envisioned as a comprehensive state university which values service through high-quality education. The campus will be distinctive in serving the diverse people of California, especially the working class and historically undereducated and low-income populations. It will feature an enriched living and learning environment and a year-round operation. The identity of the university will be framed by a substantive commitment to multilingual, multicultural, gender-equitable learning. The university will be a collaborative, intellectual community distinguished by partnerships with existing institutions both public and private, cooperative agreements which enable students, faculty, and staff to cross institutional boundaries for innovative instruction, broadly defined scholarly and creative activity, and coordinated community service.

The university will invest in preparation for the future through integrated and experimental use of technologies as resources to people, catalysts for learning, and providers of increased access and enriched quality learning. The curriculum of CSUMB will be student and society-centered and of sufficient breadth and depth to meet statewide and regional needs, specifically those involving both inner-city and isolated rural populations, and needs relevant to communities in the immediate Tri-County region (Monterey, Santa Cruz, and San Benito). The programs of instruction will strive for distinction, building on regional assets in developing specialty clusters in such areas as: the sciences (marine, atmospheric, and environmental); visual and performing arts and related humanities; languages, cultures, and international studies; education; business; studies of human behavior, information, and communication, within broad curricular areas; and professional study.

The university will develop a culture of innovation in its overall conceptual design and organization and will utilize new and varied pedagogical and instructional approaches including distance learning. Institutional programs will value and cultivate creative and productive talents of students, faculty, and staff, and seek ways to contribute to the economy of the state, the well-being of our communities, and the quality of life and development of its students, faculty, and service areas.

The education programs at CSUMB will:

- Integrate the sciences, the arts and humanities, liberal studies, and professional training;
- Integrate modern learning technology and pedagogy to create liberal education adequate for the contemporary world;
- Integrate work and learning, service and reflection;
- Recognize the importance of global interdependence;
- Invest in languages and cross-cultural competence;



- Emphasize those topics most central to the local area's economy and ecology, and California's long-term needs;
- Offer a multicultural, gender-equitable, intergenerational, and accessible residential learning environment.

The university will provide a new model of organizing, managing, and financing higher education:

- The university will be integrated with other institutions, essentially collaborative in its orientation, and active in seeking partnerships across institutional boundaries. It will develop and implement various arrangements for sharing courses, curriculum, faculty, students, and facilities with other institutions.
- The organizational structure of the university will reflect a belief in the importance of each administrative staff and faculty member, working to integrate the university community across "staff" and "faculty" lines.
- The financial aid system will emphasize a fundamental commitment to equity and access.
- The budget and financial systems, including student fees, will provide for efficient and effective operation of the university.
- University governance will be exercised with a substantial amount of autonomy and independence within a very broad CSU systemwide policy context.
- Accountability will emphasize careful evaluation and assessment of results and outcomes.

Our vision of the goals of California State University, Monterey Bay includes: a model pluralistic academic community where all learn and teach one another in an atmosphere of mutual respect and pursuit of excellence; a faculty and staff motivated to excel in their respective fields as well as to contribute to the broadly defined university environment. Our graduates will have an understanding of interdependence and global competence, distinctive technical and educational skills, the experience and abilities to contribute to California's high-quality workforce, the critical thinking abilities to be productive citizens, and the social responsibility and skills to be community builders. CSUMB will dynamically link the past, present, and future by responding to historical and changing conditions, experimenting with strategies which increase access, improve quality, and lower costs through education in a distinctive CSU environment. University students and personnel will attempt analytically and creatively to meet critical state and regional needs and to provide California with responsible and creative leadership for the global 21st century.

HISTORY

We grew out of Fort Ord, a decommissioned Army base with a rich history going back to 1917. Throughout the '50s, '60s, and '70s, Fort Ord was a major location for basic training, reaching its heyday during the Vietnam War. Even celebs like Jimi Hendrix and Clint Eastwood completed basic training here. In all, more than 1.5 million men and women received basic training at Fort Ord.



HONORING THE LEGACY OF FORT ORD

Fort Ord closed in the summer of 1993, and one year later, California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) was officially recognized as the 21st campus in the California State University (CSU) system. Richard E. "Hank" Hendrickson, then Executive Dean of CSUMB, signed the deed for the land on August 29, 1994.

Over the next several years, CSUMB continued to grow and evolve. We added new majors. We fielded athletic teams competing in more sports. Brand new state-of-theart classroom buildings and residence halls went up, and we started getting attention and recognition for what we had accomplished — our Service Learning program was highlighted in U.S. News, Intel praised our wireless accessibility, and the team of scholars who accredited us said, "It is our view that CSUMB is a product of scholarship at its best — rigorous, ethical, socially responsible, and respectful of the values and strengths of a diverse group of people who have adopted a common vision and sense of purpose."

Today, you'll still find pieces of Fort Ord's military past across campus -- in murals, in renovated buildings, and even in new buildings like the Alumni & Visitors Center (the lobby ceiling is made of wood recycled from demolished Army barracks). You'll also find the wisdom and creativity of the founders in the faculty and in the curriculum. You'll enjoy traditional events such as Earth Week and hangouts like the BBC, started up by pioneer alumni. And you'll have a chance to weave your own story into ours, and become a part of our history as it unfolds.





EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM (EOP)

EOP aims to improve the access and retention of low-income and first-generation college students by providing admission, academic, and financial support services. Students must meet EOP eligibility guidelines and submit the California State University application materials required by the Admissions Office, as well as complete the EOP application portion.

ACADEMIC & UNIVERSITY POLICIES

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) FERPA is a federal law regarding the privacy of student records and the obligations of the institution, primarily in the areas of release of the records and the access provided to these records. Education records include academic, financial, health and student conduct records. This information is protected under FERPA, and parents may not have access unless the student has provided authorization that specifically identifies what information may be released to the parent(s).



STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

As a student at CSU Monterey Bay, you are not only a member of the larger university community but also a member of the community within your residence hall, suite, apartment, or court. Living in close quarters with others who are new to you is not always easy. Everyone comes from a different background and brings different experiences and expectations for living in campus housing. Student Housing & Residential Life Community Standards and university policies are intended to give you, your roommate(s), and your neighbors a common set of expectations by which you can all live and learn together.

It is the responsibility of each individual to know and abide by these Community Standards, in addition to the CSU Monterey Bay Policies and Regulations and Student Code of Conduct. To carry out its work of teaching, research, and public service, CSU Monterey Bay faculty, staff, administrators, and students have an obligation to maintain conditions under which the university can proceed freely. This is done by the highest standards of quality, institutional integrity, and freedom of expression, with full recognition by all concerned about the university community's rights, privileges, and responsibilities. Each community member is responsible for maintaining an environment conducive to achieving the university's mission.

The Office of Student Conduct supports the University's educational mission by administering the CSU Student Disciplinary process in a fair, timely, respectful and educationally purposeful manner. Student Conduct collaborates with faculty, staff and students to provide a safe, fair and supportive learning environment.

The Office of Student Conduct provides outreach and education related to student rights and responsibilities, CSU student disciplinary policies and procedures. We work in support of students attaining their academic goals and to facilitate integrity and ethical development.



ACADEMIC INTEGRITY ₹

Academic integrity is of central importance to an education at CSUMB. The core of this integrity resides in the scholastic honesty of the CSUMB community, and therefore, is the responsibility of all students and faculty to uphold and maintain. Forms of academic dishonesty include: cheating, fabrication, plagiarism, and collusion in any of these activities. We value informal resolution of academic integrity allegations; however, students discovered to have engaged in academic dishonesty will be sanctioned.

ACADEMIC STANDING ■

This policy defines the types of GPA counts used at CSUMB, and informs students of the conditions for which they may find themselves eligible for academic honors or academic probation/disqualification. It also highlights the ways in which students may be able to improve their GPAs.

ANTI HAZING R

CSUMB has a zero-tolerance hazing policy. "Hazing" includes any method or initiation or preinitiation into a student organization or any pastime or amusement engaged in with respect to such an organization which causes, or is likely to cause, bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm, to any student or other person attending any school, community college, college, university or other educational institution in this state. California law makes hazing a potential felony, punishable with up to one year in prison, \$5,000 in fines, and liability for injury to any persons harmed.

Examples: Discovering the multiple pathways of your major, engaging with your Success Team, exploring the non-linear path to your occupational goal




General Education

The State of California requires completion of a 48 unit General Education Breadth program which includes a minimum of 9 upper division GE semester units taken no sooner than the term in which the student achieves upper division status (60+ units).

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS



UNDERGRADUATE REQUIREMENTS

General Education **₹**

The State of California requires completion of a 48 unit General Education Breadth program which includes a minimum of 9 upper division GE semester units taken no sooner than the term in which the student achieves upper division status (60+ units).

First Year Seminar **R**

Students entering CSUMB as Freshman or Lower Division Transfer Students with fewer than 15 units are required to complete FYS. This course will also meet one of the lower division A-F GE requirements.

American Institutions **₹**

The CSU requires each student receiving a baccalaureate degree to be knowledgeable about the Constitution of the United States, American history, and state and local government. Courses fulfilling the US History portion of this requirement may also satisfy the Areas C, D, or F GE requirements; courses fulfilling the Civics portion of this requirement also satisfy the Area D GE requirement.

World Culture/Language **₹**

World Culture/Language is a CSUMB requirement that has a different focus, depending on the major program of study. For Liberal Studies majors and for majors that lead to a BS degree, students must successfully complete an approved World Culture/Language course. For majors that lead to a BA degree, students must demonstrate second language proficiency through the 201 level.

Upper Division Service Learning ₹

Upper Division Service Learning is a CSUMB requirement that is met by successfully completing a 300- or 400-level, S-tagged GE or Major course. All Upper Division Service Learning courses require students to complete a minimum of 25 hours of com-munity service. All Upper Division Service Learning courses teach to learning outcomes related to: Self and Social Awareness; Service and Social Responsibility; and, Action for Systemic Change. Students should consult an advisor for more information.

Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR) K

The CSU requires every student to demonstrate competence in writing skills at the upper division level to qualify for the bac- calaureate degree. There are majorrequired courses in most every undergraduate degree program at CSUMB that satisfy the GWAR. Students should consult with their academic advisor, as <u>GWAR-approved courses</u> may also satisfy upper division gen- eral education requirements in addition to major requirements.

Major Requirements

The State of California requires students to complete a minimum of 24 units in their major program of study (36 units for a BS). These units are earned through successful completion of required courses, outcomes, and experiences. Students should refer- ence the University Catalog to identify specific program requirements.

Major Learning Outcomes

All CSUMB major degree programs have a set of learning outcomes that students must satisfy through aligned courses or alter- nate assessments, as designed by the program. The University Catalog lists the MLOs for each degree program.

Concentrations

Many degree programs require students to select a particular area of study within the major in order to attain greater depth of knowledge and understanding. The University Catalog will indicate the options available to students.

Minors

CSUMB offers more than 35 different minor programs, providing an excellent opportunity for students to develop knowledge, skills, and abilities outside of their major area of focus.

Free Electives

The State of California requires a minimum of 120 semester units to be eligible for a baccalaureate degree. Students who com- plete general education and major requirements in fewer than 120 semester units are able to select additional courses as needed to meet the state requirement.

Requirements & Entry Status

If you enter CSUMB as a freshman, you must fulfill all requirements while at CSUMB.



If you enter as a transfer student from a community college or another university, the specific requirements depend on your sta-tus when you enter CSUMB. Read on for more detail.

Transfer Students with Fully Certified GE Breadth Requirements

If you transfer from another California institution with fully certified GE Breadth Requirements or the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), you automatically satisfy Lower Division GE Requirements. You still need to satisfy the nine (9) units of Upper Division GE, inclusive of American Institutions (D4) and GWAR (A4), the CSUMB Language Proficiency Requirement, all major requirements and the minimum semester credit requirements. No more than 39 semester credits of GE credit certified by other institutions will be applied to the GE requirements at CSUMB.

Transfer Students without Fully Certified GE Breadth Requirements

If you enter CSUMB without having fully certified all GE Breadth Requirements or the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), you must complete all unmet GE Breadth Requirements through the corresponding CSUMB GE courses, with no less than nine semester credits at the upper-division level after achieving upperdivision status. <u>CSUMB Admissions</u> certifies

which GE area(s) you have met. You also need to satisfy the <u>CSUMB Language Proficiency</u> Requirement, all major requirements and the minimum semester credit requirements.

Entering as a Second Bachelor's Degree

Students who hold a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited institution of higher education may be admitted to CSUMB as a post-baccalaureate student.

In order to complete a second bachelor's degree at CSUMB you are required to:

- 1. Complete a minimum of 30 units in residence at CSUMB beyond the first bachelor's degree. Of the 30 units, 24 must be upper division in the major.
- 2. Complete all Major Requirements for a CSUMB bachelor's degree.
- 3. Earn a minimum 2.0 GPA for all CSUMB, cumulative and major course work comprising the second bachelor's degree.

Minimum GPA Requirement

The CSU system requires a minimum grade point average of 2.00 for courses in each of the following groupings:

- Cumulative total credits attempted, including all transfer courses
- All credits attempted in your major
- All credits attempted at CSUMB

Minimum Credit Requirements

The California Educational Code Title V requirements for California State University specify that you must complete a mini- mum number of credits in several categories. The minimum semester credit requirements are as follows:

- 70 maximum from community college 120-135 total, depending on major

BACHELOR'S DEGREE

Meet with the academic advisor for your major to review your academic record and determine the term in which you will be completing your final degree requirements.

Submitting your application for graduation

Students may submit their graduation application online from their OASIS account. Please visit the **OASIS** page for instructions on this process. Students should contact graduation@csumb.edu for troubleshooting assistance if they are unable to submit their application online.

Note: After submitting a graduation application, students must contact the Office of the Registrar within two weeks of the application date to report any incorrect application information and avoid any additional fees.

What to expect after applying to graduate

After applying to graduate, the Graduation Team will review your student records and make any necessary updates to your Academic Requirements Report in OASIS. You will be notified via CSUMB email once the review is completed. Applying on time is advantageous as it may reduce the time in which your records are reviewed.

It is your responsibility to review your Academic Requirements Report. Any areas that do not show as completed will need to be fulfilled before your degree can be awarded. If you have any questions, please contact the Graduation Team or visit your advisor.

Making changes to major requirements after you have applied to graduate

If you need to complete an alternate course for your major or minor, please work with your academic advisor to submit a substitution request in OASIS. Once a substitution request is submitted, it may take up to 2 weeks to be processed in OASIS.

Changing your graduation date

If you are required to change your graduation date to a future term, you will need to submit a new graduation application with the appropriate processing fee online in OASIS to update your student record.

Final degree verification

After the end of the term in which you have applied to graduate, a final review of your academic record will be completed. Please keep in mind that all academic coursework must have been completed by the end of the assessment period of the term in which you have applied to graduate. If coursework was completed after the assessment period, you will need to change your graduation date to a future term.

If all degree requirements have been met, your degree will be awarded.

If all degree requirements have NOT been met, you will be notified via CSUMB email of any outstanding degree requirements with further instructions. It is recommended that you contact your Graduation Counselor with any questions upon receipt of this notice.

Diplomas

Visit the <u>Diploma Information website</u> for information about diplomas.

If you would like to order additional copies of your diploma, please use the Diploma Replacement Form.

Commencement information

Visit the Commencement Ceremony website for information about the event.

The commencement ceremony celebrates the achievements of all eligible graduation candidates. Participation in commencement is voluntary and does not quarantee that a student's degree will be awarded. The completion of all degree requirements will be confirmed by a Graduation Counselor after final grades are posted at the end of each semester (refer to The Final Degree Check section above). Students do not receive their diploma at the commencement ceremony.



MASTER'S DEGREE

Meet with your program advisor to review your academic record and determine the term in which you will be completing your final degree requirements. Graduate students must have their completed Advancement to Candidacy on file in the Office of the Registrar prior to the term for which they have applied to graduate. Please visit the <u>OASIS Help</u> page for instructions on this process.

Submitting your application for graduation

Students may submit their graduation application online from their OASIS account. Please visit the **OASIS** page for instructions on this process. Students should contact graduation@csumb.edu for troubleshooting assistance if they are unable to submit their application online.

Note: After submitting a graduation application, students must contact the Office of the Registrar within two weeks of the application date to report any incorrect application information and avoid any additional fees.

What to expect after applying to graduate

During the term in which you have applied to graduate, the Graduation Counselor will notify your department of any outstanding degree requirements. Your department will contact you with this information.

In addition to all major requirements, the Graduation Counselor will also check for the following:

- 1. Continuous Enrollment
- 2. All CSU/CSUMB GPA, unit, and additional degree requirements
- 3. Terms you attained Classified Standing and Advanced to Candidacy

Making changes to major requirements after you have applied to graduate

If you need to complete an alternate course for your program, please work with your academic advisor to submit a substitution request in OASIS. Once a substitution request is submitted, it may take up to 2 weeks to be processed in OASIS.

Changing your graduation date

If you are required to change your graduation date to a future term, you will need to complete the graduation application process to change your date online in OASIS.

Final degree verification

At the end of the term in which you have applied to graduate, a final review of your academic record will be completed. Please keep in mind that all academic coursework must have been completed by the end of the assessment period of the term in which you have applied to graduate. If coursework was completed after the assessment period, you will need to change your graduation date to a future term.

If all degree requirements have been met, your degree will be awarded.

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FINANCIAL AID

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS **₹**

There are several Different types of Financial aid that you can receive, including grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study. Most of these awards require a FAFSA or CADAA submitted by the priority deadline.

FEDERAL WORK STUDY AND STUDENT EMPLOYMENT **₹**

Federal Work Study is a federally funded program that provides employment opportunities to students with the highest financial need. Placement is limited.

Add/drop deadline:

Grants may be recalculated if a change in enrollment occurs after the add/drop deadline. The student is responsible for paying additional fees assessed and/or any amount of ineligible Financial Aid as a result of decreased enrollment.



HOUSING

Finding the perfect place to live is an important part of your college journey, and we're here to make the process as seamless as possible. Whether you're a new student looking for your first on-campus housing experience or a returning student seeking accommodations for the upcoming year, we are here to help. We'll walk you through the steps and ensure you have a comfortable place to call home during your academic adventure.

RESIDENCE HALLS ₹

Located around the heart of campus, our eight Residence Halls (Cypress, Asilomar, Manzanita, Willet, Yarrow, Avocet, Tortuga, and Sanderling) provide easy access to food, entertainment, and campus services. Each building has a mailroom, laundry room, fully equipped kitchen, and lounge area. Depending on the building, occupants may have double or triple occupancy rooms with bathrooms shared amongst suite-mates.

NORTH QUAD **₹**

North Quad includes Pinnacles, Vineyard, and Strawberry Apartments. CSUMB second year students and above live in these areas on Main Campus. Pinnacles and Vineyard offers single or double occupancy rooms in either a two bedroom, one bath or a four bedroom, two bath configuration. Strawberry Apartments offers a kitchen and living space in four bedroom, two bath and two bedroom, I bath configurations.

PROMONTORY ₹

CSUMB students with 60 units and up are eligible to live in Promontory Apartments on Main Campus. Promontory has two-, three-, and four-room apartment options with single occupancy bedrooms and double occupancy bedrooms. Each bedroom has a bathroom and each apartment style includes a kitchen and washer and dryer in the unit.

EAST CAMPUS ₹

CSUMB students with families, graduate students, earned a minimum of 90 units, and those 21 years of age and older are eligible to live in these apartments. The two bedroom, one bath apartments offer a convenient commute to university classes and campus activities.

Disability Inclusive Housing

Requests for CSUMB campus housing accommodations based on medical, psychological, hearing, or other disability related needs are processed by Student Disability and Accessibility Center (SDAC) in consultation with Student Housing and Residential Life and other CSUMB departments as needed.



Plan Ahead

In order for your disability-related requests for specific housing accommodations to be fully considered by CSUMB. Some disability-related housing accommodations may take up to six months to implement. Students should contact CSUMB Student Disability and Accessibility Center (SDAC) as soon as possible to address concerns in the process of requesting and obtaining housing accommodations related to disability.

If you are new to Student Disability and Accessibility Center (SDAC) and have not yet received disability accommodations, you need to register with SDAC first. For additional information and to start the registration process, please check out SDAC Housing Accommodations.



VISITOR PARKING

A limited number of green short-term visitor parking spaces are available on campus for vehicles without parking permits. Parking in short-term visitor parking spaces is limited to the period of time displayed on the sign. Vehicles parked in excess of the posted time may be issued a parking citation. If no short-term visitor parking is available, a <u>daily permit</u> must be purchased. Vehicles with CSUMB parking permits, including North Quad, Promontory, or East Campus, are not allowed to park in shortterm visitor parking spaces and may be cited.

PARKING PERMITS

Purchase a permit online or for a planned visit: Single Day, Multi day, Semester, Academic Year, Calendar Year.

On Campus Parking Permit Purchase

Purchase a parking permit the day of your visit. When on campus look for the yellow parking permit kiosk. Parking kiosks can be found on this map and marked with a blue circle with the letter P inside.

When purchased from a permit dispenser daily permits may be:

• Purchased for one, two, or three consecutive days.

 Purchased only on the time/date needed. Daily permits are valid in all parking spaces except special use spaces such as those designated for visitors, the disabled, state

vehicles, and service vehicles. They are not valid in Promontory.

METERED PARKING

You may pay for parking with coins or with the ParkMobile app. If you choose to use the app, it is recommended that you set up your ParkMobile account prior to your visit to campus to expedite your parking experience at the metered locations.



There are six locations with metered parking stalls on campus.

- Otter Sports Complex (BLDG 90) in lot 90.
- Campus Health Center (BLDG 80) in lot 80.
- Student Center (BLDG 12) and OSU (BLDG 552) in lot 16.
- Avocet Hall (BLDG 208) in lot 208.
- At IT Services (BLDG 43), across from University Center (BLDG 29) in lot 42.
- Parking Permit Types

MAIN CAMPUS SEMESTER

Valid for Fall OR Spring semester only. Fall permits will expire on January 15. Spring permits will expire on May 31. This permit is NOT valid in North Quad Housing, Promontory Housing or Frederick Park, or Schoonover Park (East Campus) Housing.



MAIN CAMPUS ACADEMIC

Valid for Fall AND Spring semesters this permit will expire on May 31. This permit is NOT valid in North Quad Housing, Promontory Housing, Frederick Park, or Schoonover Park (East Campus) Housing.

MAIN CAMPUS ANNUAL

Valid for FALL, SPRING and SUMMER. The permit expires on August 31. This permit is NOT valid in North Quad Housing, Promontory Housing or Frederick Park, or Schoonover Park (East Campus) Housing.

MAIN CAMPUS SUMMER

The Summer permit is valid for SUMMER session only and expires on August 31. This permit is NOT valid in North Quad Housing, Promontory Housing or Frederick Park, or Schoonover Park (East Campus) Housing.

NORTH QUAD PERMITS

North Quad semester permit is valid for Fall OR Spring semester only. Fall permits will expire on January 15 and Spring permits will expire on May 31. North Quad Academic permit is valid for Fall AND Spring semesters and will expire on May 31. North Quad permits are available ONLY for North Quad residents and are NOT valid outside of North Quad parking lots 300 and 301. If you are a resident and are not given access to purchase this type of permit, email parking@csumb.edu and include your OtterID in the email.

PROMONTORY PERMITS

Promontory semester permit is valid for Fall OR Spring semester only. Fall permits will expire on January 15 and Spring permits will expire on May 31. Promontory Academic permit is valid for Fall AND Spring semesters and will expire on May 31. A limited number of permits are available for purchase. Once permits are sold out no additional permits will be available until the following semester. Promontory permits are available ONLY to Promontory residents and are NOT valid outside of Promontory parking lot. If you are a resident and are not given access to purchase this type of permit, email parking@csumb.edu and include your OtterID in the email.

MOTORCYCLE

Motorcycle permits are only valid on twowheel motor driven vehicles. Motorcycle permits are not valid on four wheel vehicles.

FREDERICK PARK

Residents of Frederick Park can order their free residential permit by clicking on the Buy Permit button. This permit is only available to residents of Frederick Park. This permit is only valid in Frederick Park Housing areas and is NOT valid in Schoonover Park, Main Campus, North Quad or Promontory parking lots. If you are a resident and are not given access to purchase this type of permit, email parking@ csumb.edu and include your OtterID in the email.

SCHOONOVER PARK PERMITS

Can be obtained at the Greystar Company located at 601 Thomas Court. Permits are only issued to vehicles registered to the residents of each unit. There is no charge for Schoonover Park permits. Schoonover Park permits are not valid in Frederick Park, Main Campus, North Quad or Promontory parking lots.

PARKING LOT INFORMATION

CITATIONS

Parking citations (Notices of Parking Violations) are issued by the University Police Department in an effort to enforce the regulations outlined in the CSUMB Traffic and Parking Regulations.

PAY A CITATION

Cash payments are not accepted. However, there is a pay station in the lobby that will accept Visa, Discover, American Express, Master Card, and e-check.

Parking citations can be paid or contested online.

CONTEST A CITATION

If you wish to contest a Notice of Parking Violation issued by the UPD, you must follow the following procedures:

1. Administrative Review Process

Within 21 days after the issuance of a Notice of Parking Violation or within 14 days from the mailing of a Notice of Delinguent Parking Violation, you may contest the Notice of Parking Violation online at pmbonline.org.

You will receive an e-mail notification from the UPD whether your request for cancellation is approved or denied. If your Request for Citation Review is denied, you may request an Administrative Hearing.

2. Administrative Hearing Process

An Administrative Hearing provides you the opportunity to contest a Notice of Parking Violation after an Administrative Review. (40200.7 CVC)

To obtain an Administrative Hearing you must request it within 21 days of the determination of the Administrative Review (first level). To request an Administrative Hearing, you must contact PMB at 1-800-700-4417.

3. Court Review

To request a court review you must, within 30 days of mailing of the Hearing Examiner's decision, file a request for review with the Monterey County Municipal Court. (40230(b) CVC)

To request a Court appeal, you must contact the Parking Management Bureau at 1-800-700-4417. The Court requires a \$25.00 filing fee to process an appeal.

The court receives and reviews the file of the Administrative Review and the Administrative Hearing. The reviewer renders a decision and notifies the UPD and the appellant (you).

There are no provisions under law to conduct administrative reviews or administrative hearings if statutory time limits for filing are not met. If the time frames outlined above are not met, all parking penalties and late fees must be paid.

PENALTY REDUCTION

Individuals cited for failure to display a valid CSUMB parking permit are eligible for a reduced penalty of \$20 if the following criteria are met:

- Ownership of a valid CSUMB parking permit prior to the time the citation was written as verified by the Parking Services staff.
- The citation must be disputed online and the required information to confirm ownership prior to the citation being issued must be provided. The payment procedure remains unchanged.
- Payment prior to the imposition of late fees muste be made.

FINE REDUCTION

Individuals cited for failure to display a valid CSUMB parking permit are eligible for a fine reduction that lowers the penalty to \$20 if the following criteria are met:

Ownership of a valid CSUMB parking permit prior to the time the citation was written and verified by the Parking Services staff.

To request a fine reduction the citation must be disputed online through the administrative review process. The required information to confirm ownership of a permit prior to the citation being issued must be provided.

The request for a fine reduction must be made before late fees have been applied.

GLOSSARY

California State University Monterey Bay (CSUMB) has a unique set of words and phrases that are commonly used by its students, faculty, and staff.

ACADEMIC TERMS

CACSS

Center for Advising Career Student Success

ACADEMIC LOAD

Full-time status is 12 units per semester, but students should complete 15 credits per semester to graduate in 4 years.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

Students falling below a 2.0 GPA in either the campus or cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation.

ACADEMIC DISQUALIFICATION

Students on academic probation who fail to make satisfactory progress are subject to academic disqualification. Disqualified students are no longer eligible to enroll in CSUMB courses. Please see https://csumb. edu/policy/academic-standing-policy for more information.

BACCALAUREATE DEGREE (B.A. OR B.S.)

A degree awarded by a four-year college or university.

CLASS STANDING

Undergraduate students are classified as the following:

Freshman (0 – 29 units), Sophomore (30 – 59 units), Junior (60 – 89 units), and Senior (90 + units).

CONTINUOUS ENROLLMENT

Students may be considered continuously enrolled in the university so long as the absence from the university does not exceed one semester.

CO-REQUISITE

A set of courses that must be completed in the same semester.

COURSE NUMBERING

Lower division: 100 - 299 Upper division: 300 - 499 Graduate level: 500 – 699

DROP/ADD

Schedule changes during the first two weeks of the semester.

GENERAL EDUCATION (GE)

Courses which allow CSUMB students to fulfill the general education requirements articulated by the state and CSU system. See online catalog for listing of GE requirements. There are both lower-division GE requirements (39 units in specific areas) and 9 units of upper-division GE in areas B, C, and D

GRADUATION WRITING ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENT (GWAR)

Students are required to demonstrate upper-division level competence in written communication by completing a "GWAR" course that is part of their major.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

The average of all earned grades attempted at CSUMB and transferred from other colleges. GPA is computed by dividing the total number of grade points by the total number of graded units attempted.



GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All students are responsible for knowing all graduation requirements, which include GEs, MLOs, and university requirements, and can check their Academic Requirements Report.

INCOMPLETE

An incomplete is a temporary grade used when a student is unable to complete work assignments during the semester but has completed at last 80% of the course and is passing at the time of extenuating circumstances. An incomplete contract is an agreement between the instructor of the course and the student. Requirements must be completed within one year.

Outcomes that must be met to complete the requirements of your major program of study.

PREREQUISITE

A course that must be completed prior to enrolling in another course.

SHOPPING CART

Where your chosen courses are stored before

moving forward to complete the enrollment process. REMEMBER: Just because you have loaded courses to your shopping cart, does not mean you have enrolled in those courses.

SYLLABUS

A course outline of assignments, grading policy, course objectives and required textbooks for a course.

TRANSCRIPT

An official copy of a student's academic record. Transcripts are available to order online through studentclearinghouse.org.

UNOFFICIAL TRANSCRIPT

An unofficial copy of a student's academic record. This document includes work in progress and can be accessed through your OASIS account.

UPPER DIVISION GENERAL EDUCATION (UDGE)

Nine units of General Education must be upper division and must be taken after a student has reached junior standing.

CENTERS AND INSTITUTES

At CSUMB, we dedicate ourselves to our students and our community. Our centers and institutes complement our academic programs, enhancing our community and the central coast. Each center or institute at CSUMB serves specific needs in the tri-county region. This includes boosting the economy, supporting English language learners, improving literacy rates, promoting physical and mental health care, and advocating for sustainability.



AA-T/AS-T to Bachelor Full Description **₹**

The Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act (SB 1440 - Padilla), signed into legislation on September 29, 2010, enables the California Community Colleges and California State University to collaborate on the creation of Associate in Arts Degree (AA) and Associate in Science (AS) Degree transfer programs. This law requires community colleges to grant an associate degree for transfer to a student once a student has met specified general education and major requirements for the degree. Upon completion of the associate degree, the student is eligible for transfer with junior standing into the California State University (CSU) system.

Students are given guaranteed admission into the California State University (CSU) system, and further are given priority consideration when applying to a particular program that has accepted the student's community college major as appropriate preparation for completion of the baccalaureate. The law prohibits the CSU from requiring a transferring student to repeat courses similar to those taken at the community college that counted toward their associate degree for transfer.



Student Services

Physical, mental, emotional and spiritual wellness

Each of the services comprising Health & Wellness Services at CSUMB — the Campus Health Center, Health Promotion and Education, Campus Advocate, Campus Chaplains, Personal Growth and Counseling Center, and Student Disability and Accessibility Center —strive to assist members of the CSUMB community in achieving and maintaining physical, mental, emotional and spiritual wellness.

Campus Advocate

The Campus Advocate supports the campus community with confidential support and quidance regarding sexual harassment, sexual assault, stalking and intimate partner violence.

Campus Chaplaincy and Spiritual Support

The Campus Chaplains provides interfaith and interdenominational pastoral care and resources, and supports faith-related clubs, programs and events. Upon request, they may provide on campus Bible study, speak to classrooms and provide one-on-one support. In addition, they host weekly on campus noon prayer and connect students to local houses of worship.

The Campus Health Center (CHC)

The CHC provides urgent, primary, and diagnostic care, as well as referral services to students, faculty, staff, their dependents, and guests of the CSUMB community. Each semester, students pay the CSUMB Health Services fee to receive the CSU-required basic student health services per Executive Order 943. The semester's Health Services fee provides students services at no additional charge including office visits, general exams, ear lavage, peak flow and ten lab tests. Discounted rates are available for additional labs:

Health Promotion and Education

Health Promotion and Education program provides knowledge and awareness of issues related to personal wellness, including mental health, suicide prevention, sexual assault prevention, nutrition, eating disorders, reproductive health, and the use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. They facilitate the adoption and maintenance of positive health behaviors and wellness practices, and offer health education programs, information, and materials to students, and serve as a resource for staff and faculty. They promote awareness of Campus Health Center services and programs, and provide practical experience for peer educators, interns, and other students interested in pursuing health-related careers.

Personal Growth & Counseling Center (PGCC)

Each semester, students pay the CSUMB Mental Health Services fee to receive the CSU-required counseling services per Executive Order 1053, including 24/7 crisis intervention, brief individual counseling, support groups, psycho-educational workshops, educational outreach programs and referrals to resources. The PGCC also supports the campus community with Otter Care trainings, such as Mental Health First Aid (MHFA), Question, Persuade and Response (QPR) and I Can Help.

Student Disability and Accessibility Center (SDAC)

The Student Disability and Accessibility Center supports students with on-campus accommodations for academic courses and housing, according to Executive Order 1111 at no fee. Academic accommodations may include but are not limited to alternative formats,, ASL interpreters, flexible deadlines, note-taking software and services, priority registration, and testtaking accommodations.

The Care Team

Identifies students who may be experiencing distress or have concerns within the university community that could potentially impact student well-being. The team consults in order to generate awareness and plan collaborative responses.



Basic Needs

Refers to the food, housing and overall wellness security of our community. Having one's basic needs met has a direct impact on the academic performance, mental health, physical health, professional development and holistic wellbeing of our students.

Residence Halls

Residential Halls are designated for first time freshmen and above. All students wanting to live in the Residence Halls must be matriculated CSU Monterey Bay students working toward a degree. Students must also be enrolled full time each semester they reside on-campus. This means 12 units per semester for undergraduates and at least 8 units per semester for graduate students. Meal plans are required.

North Quad

North Quad suites are designated for second year residence and above. All students wanting to live in either the Strawberry Apartments, or Vineyard and Pinnacles Suites in the North Quad must be matriculated CSU Monterey Bay students working toward a degree. Students must also be enrolled full time each semester they reside on-campus. This means 12 units per semester for undergraduates and at least 8 units per semester for graduate students.

Promontory

Promontory is designated for students with 60+ units or above. All students living in Promontory Apartments must be matriculated CSU Monterey Bay students working toward a degree. Students must also be enrolled full time each semester they reside on-campus. This means 12 units per semester for undergraduates and at least 8 units per semester for graduate students.

East Campus

The Frederick Park Apartments form a student residential community on Cal State Monterey Bay's East Campus. Students with families, graduate students, have earned a minimum of 90 units, and those 21 years of age and older are eligible to live in these apartments. The two bedroom, one bath apartments offer comfortable accommodations and a convenient commute to university classes and campus activities. Residents may commute by car, Monterey Salinas Transit buses, or bicycle

Living Learning Communities

Where students of similar interests, identities, and/or academic studies live together and participate in intentional learning about their chosen program as a collective. Within a community, students are actively engaged in programs like field trips, dialogue groups, faculty dinners, and increased exposure to opportunities on and off campus.
