The First month of school survey was sent out on September 24th, and closed on October 5th. We brought in about 170 responses total. In this report, we have compiled all of our findings from the survey.




## Demographic

## Further demographic breakdown








## Synchronous vs Asynchronous

## Current Class Modality Prefered modality




#### Ability to take breaks between classes

Mixture allows interaction but helps avoid zoom burnout




Pro: Asynchronous	Con: Asynchronous



## About this section


We asked students what resources have helped them this semester as well as what areas of support do they need the most help in.

We have listed the specific responses to helpful resources in the word bubble on the left and below I created a graph that shows what areas of support students need.

When asked about what resources have helped, many students responded with the learning site they use for class (Canvas vs Ilearn) and the conflicting opinions between which site was better.

We did not ask about which learning site was better but thought that the responses debating this held some significance to be captured with our data.

## **Needed Areas of Support**



The chart above shows the responses to the question about what campus support services students need the most right now. The number one response was wellness support, with many comments stating that they needed mental health services. The second highest response was academic support, with many students citing their personal struggles with classes and professors. The third highest response was basic needs, with many students mentioning their struggles with being able to take care of themselves.

#### Canvas vs Ilearn

In the chart below, we have listed some responses that cited either preference of ilearn over canvas or vice versa.

This is not representative of student feelings on the matter but we felt this was significant enough to show.
