Maintaining Immigration Status



During your time at CSUMB, it is essential that you maintain valid F-1/J-1 status. Falling out of status can result in deportation and jeopardize your ability to receive employment authorization or obtain permission to enter the United States in the future. The International Programs staff is here to advise and assist you, but ultimately **it is your responsibility to maintain valid F-1/J-1 status**.

Immigration Requirements

Failure to maintain valid F-1 or J-1 status can result in the termination of your visa and jeopardize your ability to stay or re-enter the United States in the future.

In order to maintain your status, you must meet the following requirements:

Maintain full-time enrollment



Maintain full-time enrollment during each term you are at CSUMB. You are not required to be enrolled during the summer or winter term unless you are beginning your career at CSUMB during one of those terms, or if your specific academic program requires it.

Full-time enrollment is specific to your program and degree level: Undergraduate = 12 or more units Graduate and Certificate Programs = 8 or more units

Do not work without authorization from the International Programs DSO/ARO

Authorized Work & Internships - On Campus:

- On-campus work can be authorized up to 20 hours per week
- 40 hours per week during school breaks
- Social Security Number is required



Authorized Work & Internships - Off Campus:

- Students may be eligible to work or participate in an internship off campus while attending CSUMB if it relates to area of study
- Eligibility varies by visa and program type. All off-campus work must be authorized by the CSUMB Designated School Official (DSO) or Alternate Responsible Officer (ARO)
- If you would like to work off campus, we highly recommend attending an OPT/CPT or Academic Training workshop provided by International Programs, or make an appointment with a DSO/ARO by visiting csumb.edu/international

It is recommended that students keep paper and scanned copies of all travel documents after entry into the United States for safe keeping. These include the I-20 or DS-2019, printed I-94, visa and passport.

Maintain an accurate and up-to-date passport and Forms I-20 or DS-2019



VALID PASSPORT: Your passport must be valid for at least six months beyond your period of stay in the United States (unless exempt by country-specific agreements).

VALID Forms I-20 or DS-2019: International students must be aware of the expiration date on their I-20 or DS-2019. If you cannot complete your degree by the expiration date on your I-20 or DS-2019, you must request a program extension before the expiration date on your I-20 or DS-2019. Students who do not file a program extension in a timely manner will be considered out of status.

Notify International Programs of any changes to personal or program information

LOCAL ADDRESS: Notify us about any change to your local address within 10 days of moving.

LEGAL NAME: Notify us about any change in your legal name or the legal name of any of your dependents.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM: Notify us about any changes to your academic program or course of study.

NUMBER OF DEPENDENTS: Notify us if you will be claiming a different number of dependents on your visa status than originally planned.

PROGRAM END DATE: Notify us if your program end date is anticipated to be earlier or later than expected.

Follow all travel regulations

- Visit the International Programs office to get a travel signature at least 3 weeks before traveling outside of the U.S.
- There is no travel and re-entry during the grace periods prior to program start dates and after program end dates.
- When traveling outside of the U.S. you must have:
 - 1. Your valid and signed I-20 or DS-2019
 - 2. A valid passport with at least six months expiration date when planning to return to the Unites States.
 - 3. A valid F-1 or J-1 visa upon your return to the U.S.
- It is advised that you also travel with proof of enrollment (financial documentation, admission letter, or any other supportive documentation to prove that you are an active student at CSUMB).





Transportation & Travel



Biking is the easiest way to get around campus, get to the beach, or even to downtown Monterey if you're up for a long ride! To get downtown, follow the Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail, an amazing 50 mile (80.5 km) protected bike/pedestrian path that hugs the ocean for a stunning view. To reach the trail, head west on Divarty Street and go under Highway 1.

The Otter Cycle Center (located in the Student Center) has mountain and road bikes available for rent. They will also pump air in your tires for free and provide inexpensive repairs and tune-ups. Outdoor Fix-It stations and air pumps are also available in North Quad and outside the Otter Cycle Center.

How to Get a California Driver's License

There are written and driving tests that you must pass. The written test is based on the California Driver's Handbook, which you can get at the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). The written test is offered in many languages. After you pass the written test, you will make an appointment to take the driving test. You will have to provide a car for the test.

You need to provide the following documents at the Department of Motor Vehicles (1180 Canyon Del Rey Blvd Seaside) to take the test and obtain a license:

- Your passport
- CSUMB I-20 •
- I-94 (available online) •
- Social Security Number (SSN) or a letter from Social • Security Administration Office that you are not eligible for a SSN
- If you have a driver's license from your country, • bring and show it to DMV (it has to be valid)
- Proof of residency

Or download the Uber or Lyft apps! These services are like a taxi but you use your smartphone to request rides and pay.

Air Travel

There are 4 airports students typically choose to fly from: Monterey (MRY), San Jose (SJC), San Francisco (SFO), and Oakland (OAK). MRY is the closest airport, but has somewhat limited options relative to the others. Students can travel to SJC and SFO via the Monterey Shuttle (typically called the "Airbus"). Visit montereyairbus.com for schedules and costs. OAK is about 2 hours away, but it is recommended to drive there or use public transportation from San Francisco. Visit sites like kayak.com, flights.google.com, or priceline.com to compare and shop for flights.

Car Rentals

To rent a car in the U.S., you must have a valid driver's license. Also, be aware that most car rental companies will charge extra for drivers under age 25.

ZipCar

ZipCar provides affordable on-campus car rental easily accessible through an app! Here's how it works:

- Sign up at zipcar.com/csumb •
- Reserve a car in advance of your trip •
- Use your ZipCard + the ZipCar app to unlock the car and drive!
- Return vehicle to pick up location at the end of your trip.



Free with your OtterID card, MST goes as far north as San Jose (65mi/105km), as far south as Paso Robles (108mi/174km), and everywhere in between.



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Important Information



CSUMB Dashboard

Csumb.edu/dashboard is your one-stop destination for campus news, events, and quick links to your most important tools.

Email: CSUMB uses Google's gmail service as its @csumb.edu email platform. Familiarize yourself with your CSUMB email and check it very regularly, as all official information will be sent there.

Google Drive: Google Drive contains other widely used tools, including Calendar, Slides, Spreadsheets, Docs, Forms, Maps, etc. which are free and helpful for collaborating with professors and other students.



iLearn is the CSUMB Learning Management System (LMS). Professors will use this to post your syllabus, class schedule, assignments, study guides, and more. It can be accessed through **csumb.edu/dashboard**. It is very important that you get comfortable with iLearn! **Check it out before classes start** to read all messages from your professors and download important documents.



You can access your OASIS Student Center through **csumb.edu/dashboard.** OASIS is your portal for seeing the tuition/ fees you owe, and managing housing, meal plans, and more.

Visit **flywire.com/school/csumb** for instructions on how to make online payments. If you use flywire, you will avoid the 3% charge you would have to pay using OASIS, and you will receive any owed refunds (like your housing security deposit) online, rather than by paper check. To make payments in person, visit the Campus Service Center in the Student Services Building (Bldg. 47).

Financial holds can delay or prevent you from registering for class, ordering transcripts, etc. so be sure to check that you are clear!



If you have a car on campus, you are required to have a parking permit, or you will get a parking ticket. Permits can be purchased at **csumb.edu/parking**. Be sure to never park in Handicap, Pedestrian, or No Parking zones.



You are encouraged to keep funds in a bank and not to store large sums of money in university housing. A savings and/or a checking account with a debit card will make purchases easier and safer. To open a bank account, you will need to bring your passport, I-20 or DS-2019, OtterID card, and your address in your home country and in the U.S.

If you want to use your phone from home, you can avoid expensive roaming fees by purchasing a U.S. SIM card. You must have an "unlocked phone" in order to activate your phone using a SIM card. Usually, SIM card users have a prepaid plan. Cell phones & SIM cards can be purchased at Best Buy, or at various stores at the Del Monte Shopping Center.



Internet Access

If you live on main campus, North Quad, or The Promontory, you can access wifi and cable television in your dorm, included in the cost of your tuition, by logging in with your OtterID and password.

If you live off campus or in East Campus apartments, you will need to purchase a modem and router to access the internet. These can be bought at Best Buy or online.

Visit **csumb.edu/it/networks-and-internet-access** for information and a list of recommended modems. Please do not buy an all-in-one modem/ router combination as these do not work well with our systems. Call the CSUMB Help Desk for more information – 831-582-4357.

Main Campus, North Quad, & The Promontory: You can send and receive mail from your mailbox located on the first floor of your building. Packages that are larger than the mailbox will be delivered to the Student Housing & Residential office. You will receive an email notification from the office to pick up your package.

East Campus: You will receive a mailbox key that opens a corresponding box located on each street. Packages will be delivered to your door, or you will receive a key in your mailbox to open the larger lock-boxes at the end of the mailbox grouping. The grouping also contains a slot for outgoing mail.

Academic Expectations

• Ask questions in class: Most professors expect students to ask questions during class when they do not understand something. Raise your hand and wait to be called on by the instructor. Many other students may have the same question, and the instructor needs to know what information is not clear.

• Go to your professor's office during office hours and introduce yourself: Your professors are interested in you – who you are, where you are from, and why you are here. Most international students are surprised at how friendly their professors are. Introduce yourself at the beginning of the semester so your teachers know you.

Participate in class discussions and

learning activities: All students are expected to add information and participate in classroom discussions and activities. Working in groups is very common, both inside and outside of class. It is fine to ask your classmates for help, but it is considered rude or lazy to be quiet or to do very little. Students are often expected to help teach each other by giving feedback and suggestions for improvement.

• **Show up to class:** You never know what kind of important information your professor might have, or what homework he/she may assign for the next class, so it's important to show up. Some professors will have attendance policies, while others may simply take a mental note of who shows up or not; either way, it will reflect better on you – and you'll have a more fulfilling experience – if you make it to all of your scheduled classes.

• Do your homework and study for exams:

International students are often surprised at the amount of homework American professors assign. While, yes, it can be frustrating to have your free time taken by writing papers and completing assignments, you will find that homework prepares you well for exams (in addition to good old fashioned studying), and that homework offers a chance to help – or hurt! – your course grades. • **Don't plagiarize:** You are not allowed to take someone else's work and call it your own. If you copy words from someone else's writing or speech, and paste them into your own paper, you must use quotation marks and a citation to show where the words are from. You can summarize or put information into your own words, and give a citation. Then, the reader knows where the information is from. Always ask your instructor or a professional writing tutor if you are unsure about citations. Plagiarism is a serious offense on this campus with serious consequences.

• **Ask for help:** University students are expected to take responsibility for their own learning. You must get help if you need it. Go to your professors, the Cooperative Learning Center (library second floor), the Center for Advising, Career & Student Success (library third floor), the reference librarians, or your classmates and explain what you need. There are many people who can help you to be more successful in school, but it is your responsibility to find them in enough time to make a difference.

• **Don't isolate yourself from others:** Americans like to talk, and they want to talk to you. American students and faculty may be very interested in your country and your individual cultural perspective. Share your knowledge of the world, your opinions and your talents with others. Student Behavior Codes



Boundary Observance

CSUMB is surrounded by federal land and is located within a former U.S. Army facility. Federal police have complete jurisdiction on federal property and persons entering onto federal lands are subject to all attendant laws and regulations. Trespassing in posted federal areas is strictly prohibited. Unexploded ordinance is a serious hazard in the wilderness areas on federal land. These areas are off limits.

Firearms

Possession of a loaded or unloaded firearm by a student on university property is a felony and a violation of university policy. Violators are subject to criminal prosecution and disciplinary action.

Bicycles

Every person riding a bicycle on university grounds is afforded all the rights and is subject to all the responsibilities of a driver of a motor vehicle. The riding of bicycles inside any university building is prohibited. Bicycle riding is prohibited within the campus quad and on any landscaped or lawn areas.

Skateboards, Roller-skates, and Rollerblades

Roller blading, skating, and skateboarding are permitted on university grounds only for use as transportation and only during designated hours in designated areas.

Wildlife

University property and the surrounding area are home to an abundance of wildlife including mountain lions, deer, foxes, skunks, opossums, raccoons, squirrels, birds, and reptiles. Wildlife should not be approached or fed. Wild animals are unpredictable and can be dangerous. Hunting or intentionally harming wildlife is illegal and may result in criminal prosecution.

Smoke & Tobacco Free Environment



The California State University has implemented a systemwide Executive Order prohibiting the use of tobacco in any form (including cigarettes, pipes, cigars, e-cigarettes, vapor devices, chewing tobacco, snuff, etc.) on campus property. This includes residence halls and outdoor spaces. Also included are vehicles owned, leased or rented by the university or one of the university's auxiliaries. Private vehicles on university-owned, leased, or rented land or in universityowned, leased, or rented parking structures will also be subject to compliance.

Sexual Harassment/Nondiscrimination

CSUMB and its auxiliary organizations strive to maintain a working and learning environment free from sexual harassment. Sexual harassment may range from sexual innuendos made at inappropriate times, perhaps in the guise of humor, to coerced sexual relations.

Appointments and Services

Students are strongly encouraged to make an appointment whenever possible. Walk-ins are accepted during the morning and afternoon walk-in hours on a first-come, first-served basis, with priority given to previously scheduled appointments. There is no charge for the following services:

- Office visits
- General exams
- Ear cleaning
- Sexually Transmitted Infection tests (Chlamydia & Gonorrhea)
- Pregnancy tests Throat culture
- PAP smear
- Urine analysis tests
- Complete blood count tests
- Lung capacity tests
- Strep tests
- Hemoglobin tests

HIV/AIDS tests, TB tests, flu shots, immunizations, and Hepatitis A, B, and AB shots are also available at discounted rates.

Students must present a current OtterID card. Students will be charged for missed appointments. Discounted pricing is available for other services. Please note that fees for service are due and payable at time of service. The CHC accepts cash, check, Money Order, Visa, Master Card, Discover, and ATM/Debit cards.

Prescriptions

CHC staff require a minimum of 48 hours notice for prescription refills. The CHC does not sell over-the-counter medications or devices (other than standard condoms and dental dams). The CHC does have a limited in-house pharmacy with some medications on-site.

If the CHC is closed and you have a medical emergency:

• Use any one of the emergency call boxes (with the blue light on top) located throughout campus.

• Call 911. Remember to dial 9-911 IF using a wired phone located within a building on campus.

If the CHC is closed and you do NOT have a medical emergency:

• Students may contact any healthcare facility of their choice.

• Students may go to one of the following Doctors on Duty (DOD) clinics for discounted medical care (discounts available only when the CHC is closed or you are referred by the CHC; you must bring your OtterID Card):

Safety

IN CASE OF A TRUE EMERGENCY DIAL 911 or GO TO A BLUE LIGHT PHONE and push the red button

Tell them what the emergency is, where you are, and your name, clearly and calmly. Stay on the phone until the operator tells you to hang up.

What is a "true emergency"?

A true emergency is a situation in which there is a high probability of death or serious injury or significant property loss if intervention by trained first responders is not provided immediately. Examples include a medical emergency, violence, criminal activity, fire, etc.

Examples of problems that are not true emergencies, but may be reported to the University Police (UPD) non-emergency number, include but are not limited to:

Lockout from your building or room; past criminal activity (i.e. stolen vehicle/bicycle, lost/stolen property, past assaults); extinguished minor fires; minor medical issues, and requests for assistance.

What do you do if there is a problem that is NOT a true emergency?

- 1. Contact your RA. Follow her/his instructions
- 2. If warranted, call the non-emergency number, 831-655-0268, and tell them the situation
- 3. Talk to the International Programs office if it is something that remains unresolved

Construction Areas

The campus is constantly growing and constructing new buildings and infrastructure, which can be loud and dangerous. Remain safe around thesfe areas by following all posted signs, detours, and safety instructions. Construction impct and safety information can be found online at csumb.edu/growing.





How to avoid/prepare for an emergency...

- Become familiar with the locations of the Emergency blue light phone
- Keep the "Important Phone Numbers" card with you all the time
- Ask fellow students, faculty, police officers, or CSUMB staff questions about local safety issues; ask about specific areas that you should avoid.
- Make sure you give your current and correct contact information to CSUMB International Programs.
- Know where the **central meeting point is for your housing area** in case of emergencies.
- Use the "buddy system" when walking or riding the bus at night. If that's not possible, do not hesitate to use the Night Walk service by calling 831-655-0268. Through this service, the CSUMB police department provides walking escorts 24 hours a day, 7 days a week on Main Campus.
- **Become familiar with the local wildlife.** Skunks, raccoons, squirrels, wild turkeys, snakes, deer, and the occasional bobcats, coyotes, or cougars should be avoided.
