#### **Overview**

- CIRP Freshman Study is the largest study of higher education institutions in the U.S.
- Created and administered by the HERI at UCLA.
- It is a nationally-normed study of incoming freshman characteristics.
- Since its origin in 1965, it has been taken by over 15 million students at over 1,900 institutions.



#### **Overview**

- In 2012, 236,937 respondents from 389 colleges and universities in the U.S. participated in the study.
- The survey asked over 200 standard questions in a wide variety of areas.
- At CSUMB, we administer the survey every two years to freshmen enrolled in FYS in fall.

#### The questions in the survey covered topics in:

- College profile
- ~ Financial profile
- Personality profile
- Socio-political profile



## **CSUMB Population & Sample**

- The population consisted of the 902 First-time freshmen enrolled in fall 2012.
- The sample consisted of 500 of these freshmen.
- ∼ 92% completed the survey, compared to 86% in 2010.
- The respondents closely matched the general population of freshmen on gender & ethnicity. But more non-URMs and 18 yr olds responded to the survey.
- CIRP compared CSUMB's freshmen responses to those of freshmen at 50 4-year public colleges (n= 36,533 respondents) across the U.S., including 7 CSUs.

## Some Notable Findings

- More of the freshmen in 2012 than in 2010 come from families with annual income of 60k or less and indicate they have major concern about financing their college education.
- 2012 freshmen were less likely than 2010 freshmen to indicate that they came late to class in high school.
- More of the freshmen in 2012 than in 2010 rated themselves as above average or in the highest 10% in "drive to achieve" compared with the average person their age.
- Freshmen in 2012 were less likely than those in 2010 to report that they are middle-of-the-road; however more discussed politics than in previous years (2010, 2008.) 2012 freshman were also more likely to have performed volunteer work compared to their peers in 2010 and 2008.
