

Executive Summary

In 2019-2020, the Otter Student Union (OSU) streamlined processes, enhanced services, grew its staff, and continued construction of a new 70,000 square-foot facility. OSU took a lead role in events associated with the University's 25th Anniversary and led the campus in providing creative virtual programming as the world responded to the COVID-19 pandemic. OSU met each

challenge with creativity and professionalism as staff endeavored to embrace OSU's mission, vision, and values to create physical and virtual spaces and resources for students, faculty, staff, alumni and surrounding communities.

In an effort to better utilize the talents and passions of the OSU professional staff, the team spent the summer of 2019 creating structures for continuity and providing clear points of contact for partners and customers.

For California State Monterey Bay's 25th Anniversary, OSU played a key role in each of



the large events on campus from the Welcome BBQ with 4,000 attendees to Open Campus (Discovery Day) and Werk Witch, which drew approximately 3,500 people to campus, to All Black Gala, featuring Academy Award-winning writer Dr. Kevin Willmott. Each of the events were part celebrating CSUMB's 25th, which focused on honoring the past and looking toward the future.

OSU's future is centered on expanding reach. Throughout the year, the Otter Cross Cultural Center (OC3) and Union Programming Board increased internal and external collaborations, while AV/Technical Services expanded capacity and customers, adding new equipment that allowed for improved video production and the ability to live-stream events. In March, OSU added two new professional staff, an Assistant Director of Facilities & Operations and a Marketing & Design Specialist to support the ever-increasing programs produced by OSU. Marketing and design became especially critical as the campus transitioned to virtual modalities in mid-March as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. For the remainder of the year, OSU embraced the ability to create community beyond physical spaces, providing extensive programming and resources through online tools including Zoom, social media platforms, and OSU-managed websites and webpages. Looking toward 2020-2021, OSU is eager to expand virtual programs and services as well as prepare the new facility for eventual use by a growing number of students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community members.




COVID-19 Virtual Programming

The following week, OSU/Otter Cross Cultural Center(OC3) collaborated with the School of Humanities & Communications to host "A Conversation with Dr. Marina Levina On Pandemics and the Media," a particularly relevant topic that garnered interest nationwide. The public Zoom session had 122 registered participants.

For this lead role, OSU was highlighted on the CSUMB

main page and in Monterey Bay: The Magazine of CSU Monterey Bay.

From March 19 through the end of the spring semester, OSU provided nearly 50 synchronous virtual programs along with asynchronous content on multiple platforms including the OSU and OC3 web pages, Instagram, YouTube, and Facebook.

Election 2020: What's Falling Off the Radar? (Collaboration of Otter Student Union/Otter Cross Cultural Center; Teaching, Learning, & Assessment; Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center; faculty; and Student Engagement & Leadership Development)



These programs provided for a variety of opportunities for students, staff, faculty, and the community to continue to connect as they each grappled with a new normal created by shelter-in-place orders and associated changes in their public and private lives.

In response to the pandemic, OSU determined that virtual programming should be continued into the summer. Thursday Night Trivia and Feminist Fitness Fridays are providing an important summer opportunity for connection between the campus community and beyond. The programs have been especially helpful in provided the opportunity for new students to connect.

One Thursday Night Trivia winner wrote:

Each Trivia Night explores a different topic, with a prize awarded and mailed to each winner weekly. Topics have included CSUMB, Womxn's Hxstory, Disney, Marvel, Video Games, and more. Prizes have included OSU-branded items as well as items related to pandemic response, including Otter masks, which not only provide a cute connection to CSUMB's mascot, but encourage self-care—one of OSU's four core values.

OSU is regularly engaging with the campus and larger community through these virtual programs and through a wide variety of social media posts and connections to resources.

OSU also created asynchronous and synchronous content for Virtual Orientation. During live Zoom sessions, OSU staff connected with up to 32 incoming students per session, providing information on the virtual and facility resources provided through the Otter Cross Cultural Center, OSU Programming Board, AV Technical Services, and Facilities & Operations.

Affinity Graduation Celebrations

Affinity Graduation Celebrations honor the accomplishments and experiences of CSUMB graduates who come from historically underrepresented communities. The eight Affinity Graduation Celebrations (Asian & Pacific Islander, Black, Latinx, Native American, Rainbow-LGBTQ+, Students with Disabilities, Undocumented, and Veteran) are created with the help of campus-wide committees who develop themes, identify keynotes speakers, design stoles, and incorporate cultural performances as a tool for telling the stories of their respective communities. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Affinity Graduation Celebrations took place virtually, providing a new opportunity to reach more supporters of CSUMBs graduates.

Despite limited time to transition to virtual programming, OSU/OC3 was able to produce professional, personal, and authentic celebrations. Graduates were provided with an individual slide detailing their major(s), honor(s), and first-generation status as well as the opportunity to upload a photo and personal message. Each celebration was uploaded to YouTube with links provided through the OC3 and CSUMB sites. And, OSU/OC3 mailed stoles to each participating graduate. Again, the participation amongst graduates increased from previous years with total participation at 569 graduates and nearly 5,000 views on YouTube.

Otter Student Union Facility Construction

Construction of the new 70,000 square-foot OSU facility began in August 2018, with an original expected completion of summer 2020. With COVID-19, the new completion is expected by the end of 2020. The new facility will include a 6,000 square-foot ballroom, the OC3, 10 meeting rooms, multiple flexible seating areas, Starbuck's, the CSUMB



bookstore, a convenience store, the Rookery Lounge and Game Room, Associated Students, First Year Experience & Orientation, Student Engagement & Leadership Development, and OSU offices. The new facility will also include an outdoor terrace with views of Monterey Bay and plazas on the Quad and at the corner of Inter-Garrison and 5th Avenue that will accommodate a variety of events, including outdoor movie screenings.

OC3 2019-2020 Summary

In its ninth operational year, the Otter Cross Cultural Center's (OC3) overarching themes were change, growth, and adaptability. The OC3 streamlined operations through balancing workloads, forecasting, and strategizing potential challenges as central and imperative to the mission. As a result, signature events and programs were planned earlier than ever and with less surprises. Additionally, the OC3 restructured student coordinator titles and roles, while also adapting the internship program to be more grounded within social justice education. The Center also:



- Expanded offerings within the
 OC3 library, including a
 multitude of resources for graduate and professional school admittance
- Created new relationships with CSUMB departments, local high schools, and community organizations, including developing stronger ties to Academic Affairs
- Identified new professional development opportunities for student employees
- Experienced record-breaking attendance for all signature programs

Further, from August to mid-March, the physical space of the Center hosted over 900 event hours.

The OC3 also adapted to major change in the spring of 2020 with adjustment of student coordinator roles and adapting to virtual modalities in response to COVID-19. With swift adaptability, flexibility, and strategic foresight, OC3 staff developed a series of virtual programs in less than one week, providing the first CSUMB virtual opportunities for student engagement.

The OC3 grew in new ways by offering programs such as Ramadan 101, partnering with the College of Health and Human Services, and expanding Self Care in Action to an entire week. With all of this change, the Center also pivoted and identified solutions to hosting all eight Affinity Graduation Celebrations online and mailed stoles to participants, making CSUMB the only institution in the state of California to offer eight, virtual affinity graduation celebrations.

Overview of Events, Programs, and Partnerships

Putting into action goals and recommendations from the 2018-2019 annual report, the Center focused on increasing collaboration with faculty and Academic Affairs, the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center (UROC), and community organizations. For example, OC3 partnered with CART (Cinematic Arts &

Technology) and HCOM (Humanities and Communications) to host a masterclass with Dr. Kevin Willmott as part of All Black Gala; developed a summer research program, Stories from the Border, in collaboration with UROC and HCOM; and built relationships with various LGBTQ+ community organization to co-host a LGBTQ+ youth summit. Additionally, the Center increased free resources for graduate and professional school preparation, including test-prep materials, guides, and flashcards, as well as identified key conferences for students to attend. Beyond these target goals, the Center's Signature Programs continued as campus traditions, on- and off-campus partnerships



increased, and OC3 was able to quickly pivot to online programming with grace and flexibility as CSUMB became a virtual campus as a result of COVID-19.

Campus partnerships included Associated Students, First Year Seminars, TRiO, Teaching Learning and Assessment, Union Programming Board, CSUMB @ Salinas City Center, Sustainability, Personal Growth and Counseling Center, Office of Inclusive Excellence, Undocu-Coalition, Early Outreach & Support Programs, Department of Humanities and Communication, Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center, Recreation, Multicultural Greek Council, International Programs, First Year Experience, Student Housing & Residential Life, Ethnic Studies Working Group,

Student Life, various Student Organizations, and University Affairs & Special Events.

Signature Programs and Events

OC3 Block Party (Otter Days)

To kick off CSUMB's 25th Anniversary, the Center expanded its Otter Days event into the OC3 Block Party. Rather than host an open house, OC3 staff constructed an event that incorporated successes from past



events. The OC3 Block Party included tabling for all affinity and cultural groups on campus, as well as off campus resources; provided free food; and provided cultural performances — African drummers, Aztec dancers, APIA performances, and Baile Folklorico. For baile folklorico, the Center partnered with the Alisal Center for the Fine Arts and hosted children ages 8 to 12 and their families, many of whom had never visited the CSUMB campus. It was such a proud experience, to see all of these children and their families feel part of the Otter family, providing an important opportunity for pipelines for the future of CSUMB. Over 600 people attended the inaugural OC3 Block Party, which was one of the highest attended events for the campus-wide Otter Days.

Social Justice Dialogues

Partnering with Teaching, Learning, and Assessment, as well as with individual faculty, the Center engaged in a series of topics relevant to the CSUMB community. This year's Social Justice Dialogues series focused on the theme of Courageous Conversations. The safe atmosphere cultivated by the notion of "leaving titles at the door" allowed for students, staff, and faculty to share their own experiences and feedback. Topics included: Election 2020: Power and Privilege, Stories from the Border, Trauma at the Dinner Table: Preparing for the Holidays, Hooking Up: Stigmas of Dating Across Differences, and Womxn of Color and Equitable Healthcare Access. Participation ranged from 15-75 per event with representation from students, faculty, and staff at each dialogue.

Werk Witch Drag Show

Continuing the amazing successes from its inaugural year, Werk Witch Drag Show continued to draw large crowds and praise. Werk Witch has become a well-known program for the campus and the greater Monterey community, highlighting LGBTQ+ hxstory and the importance of drag culture. This year received an overwhelming amount of auditions from a variety of students and staff, with a notable increase in participation from student performers (a total of nine

the popularity of the event, this program was distinguished as a CSUMB 25th Anniversary event and a monumental program to conclude Open Campus (Discovery Day) during RAFT Weekend, which drew prospective students and community members to CSUMB. The show was

completely sold out on University Tickets and had over 500 students, staff, faculty, and prospective students in attendance.

All Black Gala

All Black Gala is a formal event open to all who wish to celebrate Black hxstory and the immense diversity of Black culture, brilliance, and lived experiences. The fourth annual program's theme,

"Still I Rise: Reclaiming Our Stories & Seizing Our Futures" emphasized the importance of authentic representation of Black communities through storytelling and art. This year's keynote speaker, Dr. Kevin Willmott, co-writer (with Spike Lee) of the Academy Award-winning film BlacKkKlansman, shared meaningful insights into the entertainment industry and media's contributions to anti-blackness in society. With increased notoriety around this event, All Black Gala had over 450 students, staff, faculty, and community

members in attendance. As a CSUMB 25th



Anniversary-designated event, All Black Gala was a collaboration between the Division of Student Affairs & Enrollment Services, Associated Students, Otter Student Union Programming Board/OC3, Office of Inclusive Excellence, Multicultural Greek Council, Campus Traditions Committee, the School of Cinematic Arts & Technology, and the School of Humanities &



Communications. This year experienced a significant rise in the level of engagement with community members with the screening of BlacKkKlansman and the addition of an art exhibition, student performances, and a masterclass facilitated by Dr. Willmott. The series of event expanded All Black Gala into a multi-day celebration of black hxstory.

Ignite! Social Justice Retreat

Ignite! is an annual three-day retreat that allows students to focus on aspects of storytelling, art, and dialogue in order to reflect on systems of oppression and understand roles in engaging in activism. Professional staff facilitators (including representation from the departments of Recreation, Student Housing and Residential Life, and Early Outreach and Support Programs) continued their collaboration on curriculum development. The strong foundation set from the previous year's curriculum was invaluable to the success of this year's Ignite!.

International Womxn's Day Celebration

International Womxn's Day commemorates the global celebration of womxn's hxstories, resilience, and accomplishments. The third annual International Womxn's Day speaker, Yesika Salgado, is an award-winning, published, and renowned Salvadoran poet, activist, and social critic. Salgado explores issues of body-positivity, cultural pride, and feminism. For the event, she provided a poetry reading of her latest book, Hermosa, and offered a writing workshop for students, faculty, staff, and community members. The writing workshop highlighted the importance of claiming one's story as an avenue for social justice and emphasized the power of self-love, particularly for marginalized populations. Participants expressed their gratitude for experiencing the workshop and poetry reading as a space for empowerment, creativity, self-exploration, and vulnerability. Sixty participants were present for the writing

workshop and 100 were in attendance for the



poetry reading. This event offered catering at both events and was in collaboration with the Otter Student Union Programming Board and Associated Students.

Safe Zone: Faculty and Staff

Safe Zone is offered each semester to CSUMB faculty, staff, and community partners (Salinas High School, Interim non-profit, and Skyline College) and provides resources and specialized two-day training focused on supporting LGBTQ+ populations. Safe Zone curriculum is developed, revamped, and implemented by the Safe Zone Committee each year to stay current on trends and strategies. Safe Zone offers an educational curriculum that centers on intersectional, reflective, and arts-based learning, while providing applicable tools to intervene and support communities in processing identities and crises. The curriculum was revamped, along with the logo, in 2019-2020 to include LGBTQ+ hxstory, terms, laws, and popular culture. Participants are offered interactive assignments that deepen their understanding of their identities, power, and

systems of oppression. Safe Zone was offered fall semester to 45 participants from CSUMB,



Salinas High School, and Interim. Club advisors for the LGBTQ+ student organization and mental health counselors from Salinas High School valued the Safe Zone Training so much that OC3 was invited to provide a discussion with all of the teachers and staff of Salinas High School on inclusive practices and strategies for LGBTQ+ youth. This program provided Safe Zone certification, catering, and Safe Zone merchandise and was in collaboration with the Office of Inclusive Excellence. Below are some experiences that participants shared in evaluations.

"This was an amazing training! We laughed, cried, and learned so much. It's easier to

learn when the facilitators are so passionate and understanding."

"The best training I've been to. Such a wonderful way of presenting the material. It really encouraged critical thought."

"I really appreciated the history part of training. I will be using the liberation monologues and strategies I learned from the case studies."

Affinity Graduation Celebrations

In its third year coordinated by the Otter Student Union's Otter Cross Cultural Center, the Affinity Graduation Celebrations experienced another increase in participation and expanded the capacity to reach audiences across the state and country through YouTube. The Affinity


Graduation Celebrations honor the accomplishments and experiences of CSUMB graduates who come from historically underrepresented communities. This year, the eight Affinity Graduation Celebration Committees worked to identify themes and keynote speakers to tell the stories of their respective communities. Some of the themes this year included: "El Espejo: Bridging the Past, Present, and Future"; "Our Ancestor's Wildest Dreams"; "Remembering Roots and Connecting Futures"; and "Reclaiming Our Narratives and Redefining Success." While the Affinity Graduation Celebrations were not in-person in 2020, the caliber of programming was maintained and enhanced. Graduates were provided with opportunities to have personalized slides that



included their first generation status, photo, personal message, honors, and their attained degree. Additionally, graduates received their stoles via mail. By continuing to serve the CSUMB campus with virtual affinity graduation celebrations, OC3 enlivened the mission of CSUMB and affirmed the Otter Student Union's values of fostering communities, valuing voices, cultivating social justice, and providing services rooted in care. CSUMB was the only CSU to offer all affinity graduation celebrations in 2020. There were 569 graduates who participated in the virtual affinity graduations with nearly 5,000 views on YouTube. While the Affinity Graduation Celebrations were virtual due to the COVID-19 pandemic, students shared the importance of being recognized through their respective ceremonies, especially since so many celebrations were canceled or postponed due to the pandemic.

COVID-19 Online Programming

OSU was the first department at CSUMB to provide virtual programming as a result of COVID-19. Particularly appropriate, OC3 hosted an initial program with Dr. Marina Levina, author of Pandemics and the Media and Associate Professor of Communication Studies at the University of Memphis. This event was extremely timely, held less than one week after the campus officially went online, with 122 who registered for the Zoom webinar. For the remainder of the spring semester,



Center staff facilitated several live programs on Zoom and shared asynchronous content on social media. Notable programs included:

Select Student Staff Programming

For 2019-2020, OC3 restructured the student coordinator roles, merging the dialogue and education roles to create two new positions: Courageous Conversations and Signature Programs. Other position changes included changing Cultural Arts to Community Arts and Cultural Enrichment to Cultural Engagement. Additionally, the change in structure provided an opportunity to modify the internship to include more professional development and social

justice reflection through a new training curriculum. Lastly, all positions added participation in committees beyond OC3.

Student coordinators participated in two professional development days (one each semester) devoted to putting learning into practice, engaging more deeply in social justice topics.

In the fall, student coordinators learned about food and environmental justice through working on the Pie Ranch farm in Pescadero. The students all had the opportunity to pick apples and pears, along with cooking lunch together, in order to learn first-hand the challenges of producing food. This was followed by a discussion about sustainability, farmworkers, and exposure to farm pesticides. In the spring, students publicly engaged with



passersby on social justice topics in San Francisco. They shared lunch and wisdom with an alum student coordinator (Jenelle Borja) and ended the day with a mural tour in the Mission District.


The OC3 provides experiential training to explore issues of social justice, equity, inclusion, and power, for on- and off-campus partners. OC3 staff provide intentional, inclusive, and meaningful dialogues and activities for participants, centering on the importance of authenticity, creativity, and empathy. In 2019-2020, the OC3 offered workshops and trainings to the faculty of CSUMB's Physician Assistant Program, professional and student staff of the Early Outreach Support Programs, Orientation student staff, Housing & Residential Life professional and student staff, as well as for the Office of Inclusive Excellence's Diversity Learning Series. In addition, OC3 staff presented to over 100 staff, administrators, and educators at Salinas High School on inclusive strategies to support LGBTQ+ students in and out of the classroom.

Womxn's Leadership Retreat

The OC3 continued its collaboration with Recreation's Outdoor program through developing curriculum for the Womxn's Leadership Retreat. Participants analyzed feminist concepts and engaged in theatre and storytelling to explore identity development, systems of oppression, and the power of community. Students noted that sharing space with womxn of differing identities and stories enlivened within them a new understanding of utilizing intersectional approaches to advocacy.

Stories From the Border

In February 2020, the two-hour speaker series "Stories from the Border" featured border theory scholars and CSUMB student researchers in dialogue with one another. The students were the six CSUMB HCOM UROC researchers who participated in a research and border theory intensive trip to El Paso, TX in summer 2019. The speakers included Dras. Judith Flores Carmona and



Cynthia Bejarano, both from New Mexico State University. Dra. Flores Carmona is a CSUMB HCOM alum who specializes in borderlands testimonios and methodologies. Dr. Bejarano is a renowned scholar on borderlands policies and co-founder of Amigos de las Mujeres de Juárez, an organization working with Mexican women's rights organizations to end violence against women in Chihuahua, Mexico and the borderlands.

Topics for the event included contemporary political issues of the US/Mexico border, border policies, and borderlands testimonios. Over 100 people attended the event, which was also a collaboration with the College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences; the

College of Health and Human Services; and the School of Humanities and Communications. It was sponsored by the 25th Anniversary with funding through the Office of the Provost. This event was a great example of the benefits of building relationships with universities outside of the area and connecting students with scholars across the country.

Writers From the Edge

Writers from the Edge is an annual series of known and emerging authors who highlight a range of topics including migration, ethnic histories, transnational histories, and sexual identity. This program began several years ago in partnership with the School of Humanities and Communications and occurred during the spring semester. It was later expanded to the full academic year in 2018. In the 2019-2020 academic year, the program was awarded Special Events funding and was attended by more than 100 participants at each program.

Select Community Events

The OC3 continued to develop strong relationships with CSUMB @ Salinas City Center and other community organizations.

Monterey County Womxn's March

The OC3 developed a community partnership with the Monterey County Womxn's March, part of a national movement. On January 19, 2020, the OC3 advocated and raised awareness of racial, gender, sexual, and economic inequities and violence. OC3 staff spoke at the rally and tabled as a resource to the Monterey County community. The Monterey County Womxn's March had over 2,000 community members in attendance.



Monterey County LGBTQ+ Collaborative and Youth Conference

The Monterey LGBTQ+ Collective is a hub for organizations and providers from Monterey County to share resources, collaborative projects, and services that support Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Queer+ communities. This year, OC3 staff chaired the committee and worked collectively with community partners (Epicenter, California Rural Legal Services, Monterey Rape Crisis Center, Salinas High School, Soledad School District, Salinas Pride, Middlebury Institute of International Studies, Planned Parenthood, and Monterey High School) in order to plan and execute the LGBTQ+ Youth Conference for the Tri-County areas. The youth conference would have taken place in March at Soledad High School with educational workshops, resources, and social opportunities for middle and high school students. Due to COVID-19, the conference has been postponed until an undetermined later date.

Pride Celebration

This year, OC3 joined the Monterey County and Salinas Valley Pride committees and developed a partnership and connection to CSUMB. In response to COVID-19, for 2020, there will be a virtual Pride Celebration with Pajaro Pride, Salinas Valley Pride, Santa Cruz Pride, and Monterey Peninsula Pride. Virtual programming will include LGBTQ+ educational workshops, entertainment, and advocacy opportunities. Through this collaboration, OC3 is expanding its community outreach and capacities for the educational pipelines to CSUMB. The virtual Pride Celebration will take place on August 1 and expects an attendance of 1,000 community members.

Dia de los Muertos

In addition to CSUMB @ Salinas City Center, OC3 collaborated with Salinas community organizations including Hijos del Sol, Baktun 12, Steinbeck Rotary, the Steinbeck Center, the Epicenter, and Salinas Public Library to host several artsbased workshops leading up to Dia de los Muertos First Friday at the CSUMB @ Salinas City Center. This year's event was larger than last year and included food trucks, a larger and more prominent altar, multiple workshops, and lots of

dancing. OC3 student coordinator Lilo Lopez (Community Arts) played a central role in the planning and execution of the event. During the Dia de los Muertos event, the OC3 provided photos to attendees, hosted a crafts table, and promoted the OC3 and Otter Student Union to local community members. This celebration broke records with over 5000 in attendance from across the Monterey Peninsula.

Student Conference Attendance

A core part of OC3's values includes providing opportunities for students to put into practice what they are learning in the






classroom. As such, OC3 staff continually seek funds to take and/or financially co-sponsor student travel to conferences as a high-impact practice for student progression, retention, and graduation. This year, the OC3 supported students to attend the following conferences:

- National Women's Studies Association (2 students)

Recommendations for 2020-2021

To continue the meaningful work of the OC3 in impacting campus and the surrounding communities, the following will be areas of focus for 2020-2021:

Strategic Partnerships

Relationship building is the key to success for work in diversity, equity, and inclusion. The OC3 has forged strong partnerships with Academic Affairs departments including HCOM, First-Year Seminar, Collaborative Health & Human Services, VPA, Psychology, Education, and CART, CSUMB @ Salinas City Center, the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center, and Teaching, Learning, & Assessment; the Office of Inclusive Excellence; and departments in Student Affairs and Enrollment Services. The OC3 seeks to continue strengthening these partnerships as well as continue to expand partnerships with off-campus partners such as Interim, Salinas Valley Pride, Monterey Peninsula Pride, and the LGBTQ Collaborative. Three areas of particular interest for growth are:

- Faculty and Academic Affairs
- The Cooperative Learning Center
- **Community Organizations**

Targeted Populations

In anticipation of virtual modalities and needs to shift to new normal, rather than focusing on specific populations to increase retention, progress, and graduation, the OC3 will be intentional about cultivating broad support services, programs, and resources that multiple populations can utilize. The OC3 will continue to support Queer students and communities through the QT Peer Mentoring Program and Safe Zone trainings, ensure all eight Affinity Graduation Celebrations, and offer Signature Programs. The Center will also transition library and test prep materials online and connect students with digital conference opportunities. Additionally, the OC3 will focus provide speakers who can highlight voices and perspectives in the fight for social justice.

Special Topics and Projects

In 2020-2021, the OC3 is celebrating its 10th Anniversary and will accept the challenge to celebrate virtually and flexibly. Programming will be grounded in addressing the following issues:

- Election 2020
- Issues of racial justice
- Intersectional Feminism
- Highlighting the scholarship and artistic work of QBIPOC individuals and communities
- Financial literacy

In addition, in response to health concerns amidst the global pandemic, the OC3 plans to convert Ignite! 2021 into a one-day virtual symposium. This would allow the program to reach the campus community and beyond, including neighboring institutions and local community organizations.



Union Programming Board

Otter Student Union Programming Board Summary

The Union Programming Board had record attendance at Late Night, Werk Witch, Sundae

Funday, Battle of the Bands, and Hot Cocoa to Go Go, with lines wrapping around the halls surrounding the Otter Cross Cultural Center. In preparation for the new OSU facility in 2020-2021, the OSU Programming Board analyzed data of previous years to attempt to draw in new audiences on new days. As an example, Sundae Funday was developed to attract students to the Student Center on a Sunday, typically the slowest day each week. The inaugural event brought in 125 attendees, indicating that programming on Sunday's can be successful.



The spring of 2020 brought about new tests, first with a totally new program, Roll With It, a roller skating party at Water City Sports as part of the spring semester kick-off, and then with



the COVID-19 pandemic. Roll With It, a collaboration with First Year Experience, saw the creation of community as more than 70 students walked over to Water City Sports together from campus to find an additional 70 students already at the venue and ready to skate into the semester—a semester with exciting inperson programs and a totally new group of virtual programs.

While the spring semester began with successful in-person events including Winterlands, Plant Your Intentions, and

All Black Gala, as of mid-March, programming was tasked with turning virtual in light of the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Programming Board swiftly shifted programs online (such as the Ebo Barton poetry slam) and developed new programs to fill the void for events that could not be switched to virtual modalities (such as Sundae Funday). In addition to synchronous content, the Programming Board also provided asynchronous content and resources available through the OSU website as well as through social media accounts and the creation of videos for virtual Orientation. The virtual environment provided new opportunities for collaboration too, with such programs as You Otter Stay Fit, in partnership with First City Crossfit of Monterey.

On many occasions, events exceeded





improvement from past years.





Spring Programming

Spring semester began with new events like Roll With It and plans for increased community involvement in programming. All Black Gala was particularly successful in bringing together the campus and surrounding communities. All Black Gala included three events: a film screening of the Academy Award-winning Black KkKlansman, co-written by Dr. Kevin Willmott; the Gala with a keynote from Dr. Willmott; and a masterclass by Dr. Willmott co-sponsored by the School of Cinematic Arts & Technology and the School of Humanities & Communications. Three community members attended the movie screening, 166 the Gala, and 17 the masterclass. Total attendance for the Gala was up by nearly 150 attendees from 2019, for a total of 440 in attendance.





These numbers were consistent with increased attendance and community participation at events throughout 2019-2020, leading the Programming Board to plan an expanded, community-engaged battle of the bands, Otterpalooza, which was scheduled for March 2020. Partnering with local radio station KRML, radio ads and an appearance on the show "pub talk" highlighted Otterpalooza to the community. Several community bands, including a high school band, auditioned for the event before it was postponed, then, ultimately canceled, due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the ultimate transition to virtual modalities.

By mid-March, CSUMB transitioned to virtual modalities. A few planned programs could be transitioned successfully online, such as Ebo Barton's poetry slam. Others, including a spring Sundae Funday, could not. The Board met the new planning with creativity, including planning new series events that would allow students, faculty, staff, and community to continue connecting weekly. Thursday Night Trivia became OSUs first virtual program, offered the same week the campus transitioned to virtual mode, and offered each week thereafter.

While there was some fluctuation in attendance, virtual programs drew good interest and numbers for the remainder of the semester. Attendees at the final Thursday Night Trivia event of the semester specifically talked about how they were grateful for the opportunity to connect with each other. This prompted OSU to continue offering virtual programming into the summer.

Summer Programming

These programs, which have drawn incoming as well as returning students, has provided an important continued opportunity for connections as the need for virtual modalities, harkened by COVID-19, have continued into the summer months. This is another first for OSU.



Recommendations for 2020-2021

As OSU prepares to begin the 2020-2021 in virtual mode, the focus will be on expanding virtual programming efforts and exploring additional software beyond Zoom for providing engagement opportunities. The Programming Board will also continue to utilize social media as a way to connect students with one another and with faculty, staff, alumni, and community members. Continued and new partnerships with CSUMB departments and external organizations will also be a priority.


In addition to a focus on the virtual, the Programming Board will also prepare plans for use of the new OSU facility.




OSU Top Performing Posts: July – December (Instagram)




OSU Top Performing Posts: January – June (Instagram)

Recommendations for 2020-2021

As OSU continues to engage with students, faculty, staff, alumni, and the community virtually, marketing will be especially integral. From communicating about programming and resources to providing updates on OSUs physical and virtual spaces, marketing will be challenged to provide audiences with approachable posts. OSU will also expand the reach of OSU Weekly, utilizing the email newsletter to cultivate and expand relationships with a wide variety of audiences, keeping with OSUs mission. Marketing will also be critical once the campus reintroduces in-person offerings, including opening the new OSU facility.

Facilities & Operations

Facilities & Operations Summary

For 2019-2020, the Otter Student Union managed two spaces – the Student Center and the Black Box Cabaret (BBC) – and set up and hosted events in other campus spaces. The OSU facilities team provides space management and processes all requests for OSU spaces as well as all requests from student organizations. These requests were up significantly (a total increase of 42%) in 2019-2020 from 1,868 in fall 2018 to 3,027 in fall 2019 (a 62% increase) and up from 1,977 in spring 2019 to 2,418 in spring 2020 (a 22% increase). It is important to note that spring requests were only through March 17, when the campus transitioned to virtual modalities amid the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to the expectation that a larger increase would have occurred for in-person space reservations.

To assist with management of OSU facilities and with OSU-related events held in other venues, in 2019-2020, Facilities & Operations employed a total of 18 student staff. Student assistants have a wide variety of duties including opening and closing the facilities, customer service, event and equipment set-up, game room equipment check-out, providing campus information, assisting with projects for OSU units, lost and found, and event security and parking/traffic assistance. The Student Center also provides fax and copy services.

During the academic semesters, the Student Center is open Monday through Thursday 17 hours per day, Friday 15 hours per day, and 12 hours per day on weekends, combining for a total of 107 hours of weekly service. 
Spring 2020 Meetings Monthly Trend (Jan. 20 - March 17)







Black Box Cabaret

A unique space on campus, the BBC can host a variety of events from dances and capstone project implementations to film screenings, lectures, classes, and department trainings, as well as year-end banquets and ceremonies. As the CSUMB campus has grown, the BBC, which is able to accommodate a maximum of 263 attendees standing or roughly 90 seated, has become too small for many campus events. The number of events hosted in the BBC, therefore, has consistently decreased over the last few years. In response, OSU has marketed the space to wider varieties of groups, both on campus and beyond. This has resulted in such reservations as capstone projects and trainings by departments and organizations.

Recommendations for 2020-2021

The Otter Student Union has continued to increase the collection of a variety of data, quantitative and qualitative, to utilize in preparation for the opening of the new OSU facility. In the new facility, the OSU anticipates being able to more fully accommodate student clubs and organizations, campus departments, as well as external customers in ways that have not been possible in the Student Center and BBC. In the new facility, OSU will grow from having 4 spaces available for reservations to more than 12 interior and 3 exterior spaces available for reservations. OSU will utilize data from recent years and forecast future use in preparation. This will include developing schedules for the student assistant positions, which will become more specialized with positions focused on event set-up and facility maintenance; customer service and game room management; and reservations.

For virtual spaces, OSU will continue to serve as the primary office for reserving spaces. It will also be important to track data on virtual space use given that the campus will continue in virtual modalities as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Technical Production

Audio Video/Technical Production Summary

Otter Student Union Audio, Video, and Technical Services expanded services and diversified equipment in addition to providing much-needed support in the transition to virtual modalities that occurred in March 2020. In order to accomplish these successes, OSU acquired higher-end professional sound, lighting, and video production equipment and expanded video production.

The new equipment allowed for expanded services available to customers and new offerings for OSU programs. For example, OSU was able to livestream events including Obstacle Course Dodgeball, Battle of the Bands, Werk Witch, and All Black Gala. For the School of Business, OSU streamed the Greater Vision Showcase and the 18th Annual Ethics and Responsible Business Forum.







The year kicked-off with Welcome BBQ, which included a live performance by Loote and emceeing provided by the Otter Student Union Programming Board for an audience of 4,000

students, faculty, and staff. Another CSUMB 25th Anniversary event, Open Campus (Discovery Day), provided an opportunity to highlight OSU capabilities. The AV/Tech team was able to service up to 7 events, each in a separate location, in one day. The event was in collaboration with the CSUMB IT Networking Team and included simultaneously broadcasting from five locations (the Flag Pole in the Main Quad, the Library, the World Theater, the Reading Center, and lot 82). At the same time, the team also supported a live band playing in the Crescent and prepped for the Werk Witch Drag Show event at the University Center.

2019-2020 Events









OSU provided services for a variety of events, including Midnight Madness at the Otter Sports Center. This event gives OSU an opportunity to truly highlight all of the capabilities of AV/Technical Services with exciting sound and lighting taking place during the multi-hour event.

Many of the events in 2019-2020

gave OSU the opportunity to diversify customers and event types, as well as to test equipment that will be key to the ability to provide services in the new OSU facility, scheduled to be completed in fall 2020.

OSU was in the process of testing equipment in The World Theater for a planned Otterpalooza, which was drawing bands from the community and campus, when the campus transitioned to virtual modalities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, the team transitioned to providing online services, including support for the eight virtual affinity graduation celebrations.



Recommendations for 2020-2021

With the campus in virtual modalities, AV/Technical Services will be tasked with providing virtual support for OSU programs. Additionally, as the OSU facility is completed in 2020, AV/Technical Services will have extensive testing and training to optimize capabilities in the new spaces. There will also be a need to expand to more operations throughout the entirety of the year, requiring a continued development of more robust services.

Finances

Finance Summary

The Otter Student Union completed its first full fiscal year with financial services provided through an agreement with the University Corporation at Monterey Bay. OSU developed important protocols and processes to improve efficiencies, including setting up the ability to take ACH payments to minimize the need for some paper checks.

For 2019-2020, OSU continued to generate more revenue than projected, even with the postponement of several reservations when the campus went to virtual modalities in mi-March. OSU was also able to continue pushing funds to the construction project and to adjust to enrollment fluctuations.

Revenue/Expense Recovery

Student fees account for the majority of funding for OSU. The OSU also generates expense recovery through departmental services including staffing, equipment, and AV/Technical Services for events throughout campus and in the larger Monterey Bay community; services at the Black Box Cabaret; and staffing for unscheduled-hours of use of the Student Center.

Despite a shortfall on student fees due to lower enrollment in 2019-2020, fund equity and additional expense recovery/revenue resulted in available funds of \$27,969.26 over budgeted expectations. The increased expense recovery/revenue was generated through increased programming and services, including video production and live-streaming of video made possible through new equipment purchases.

Fundraising

Greg Bistline (gbistline@csumb.edu), Director of Development, continues to seek funding for the Otter Student Union, including the Otter Cross Cultural Center, which saw the first year of earnings from previous efforts.

Expenses

Overall, expenses were less than budgeted. The area with added expense was in equipment. As OSU has increased abilities in AV/Technical Services, OSU has been able to garner more customers and do more programming in-house instead of through contractual services. In order to continue along this path, it was necessary to utilize a portion of the programming budget for equipment to be used for programming and services. The purchased equipment was particularly timely as OSU was asked to take a prominent role in numerous CSUMB 25th Anniversary events (Welcome BBQ, Open Campus, and All Black Gala), to provide additional services for the School of Business, and to assist with programming that was moved to virtual modalities in mid-spring

2020. The transition to online also meant a reduction in anticipated travel and professional development expenses with many late-spring and early-summer conferences canceled.



Total actual expenses for 2019-2020 were down 291,361.27 from budgeted expenses. Combined with additional revenues, OSU will again have good available fund equity moving into the 2020-2021 fiscal year.



Research Grants:

- \$5k. Awarded from California State University Monterey Bay's UROC (Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center) Course Based Undergraduate Research Experience (CURE); the award provides faculty to develop plans, instructional materials, curriculum, and evaluation strategies to construct a new research-based course aimed at serving General Education requirements and/or first-year incoming students. The grant was one of the first humanities and social science-based research courses to be selected in the history of the grant. Award funds are utilized for planning a resource course based within border theory and teaches students in humanistic and social science research methods (photovoice, interviews, testimonio, critical discourse analysis, etc.).
- \$1.5k. Awarded from California State University Monterey Bay's UROC (Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center) Community Engaged Research Grant; this inaugural award is to facilitate projects that engage creatively with real world issues in the classroom and that expand and transform the teaching/learning environment. Award funds are utilized for planning a summer resource course and experience that brings CSUMB students to the El Paso/ Juarez border to learn border theory and engage in humanistic and social science research methods (photovoice, interviews, testimonio, etc.).

Total additional funding: \$ 10,000

Otter Student Union Programming Board



Typically, the largest expense for the Programming Board is for the Spring Concert. Due to COVID-19, the Spring Concert was postponed. As a result, expenses were less than expected.

The large percent for equipment (39%) was an investment in production gear. Rather than spend over \$13,000 each year renting equipment, it was determined that OSU could invest almost that same amount and do in-house production. This gear allowed OSU to offer expanded and competitive services to clients and assisted with OSU in-person and virtual programming and services.

Recommendations for 2020-2021

As OSU prepares to open a new facility, the focus will be on continuing forecasting, budgeting, and fundraising efforts along with the continued streamlining of processes. OSU will continue to focus on creatively utilizing funds, limiting expenses and increasing revenues, as the young organization continues to succeed in ever-changing environments.

Board of Directors

Board of Directors Summary

In the first year under the revised bylaws, OSU saw much more engagement among the directors of the Board—at events and at board meetings. Directors of the board supported the fall New Student Union showcase and helped the executive officers in tabling efforts to share more information about OSU and its new facility, scheduled to open in fall 2020. Board meetings had nearly 100% attendance at each meeting.

The OSU executive officers, under the direction of returning Board Chair Ashley Smith, continued developing policies and procedures that are essential to the proper functioning of OSU as a 501(c)3 on-profit corporation. The treasurer took part in OSU's first official audit. The chair and vice chair took a semester-long deep dive into developing important emergency and event risk management policies and procedures, which are sure to be utilized as operations continue to grow with new facilities and expanded in-person and virtual programming.

The Board continued to support OSU events through participation at Social Justice Dialogues, Werk Witch Drag Show, the Petting Zoo, Battle of the Bands, and more. In the spring, the Board hosted a New Student Union Showcase that, in part, served as a recruitment tool for the 2020-2021 Board. Executive officers also tabled extensively, recruiting a diverse slate of candidates for the 2020-2021 Board. The recruitment was completed just prior to the transition to virtual modalities in March. The annual meeting, therefore, took place via Zoom.

OSU's Executive Officers for 2020-2021 are Jaren Leary, chair; Hamza Saleem, vice chair; Mayra Ortiz, secretary; and Alejandro Robles, treasurer.

Recommendations for 2020-2021

The Board of Directors will begin the 2020-2021 year holding virtual meetings as the campus continues its virtual modalities in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. This will challenge the Board to find new ways of engagement.
