SERVICE LEARNING QUICK FACTS 2013-2014

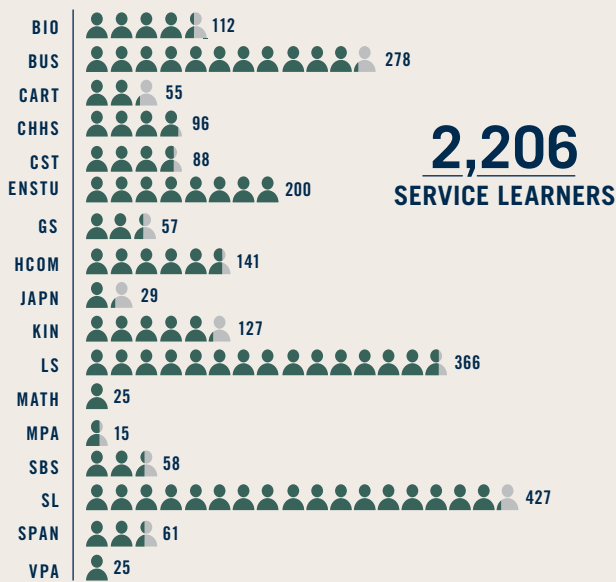
The mission of CSU Monterey Bay's Service Learning Institute is to foster and promote social justice by cultivating reciprocal service and learning partnerships among CSUMB students, faculty, staff and the surrounding tri-county communities.

During the 2013-2014 academic year, 2,206 students in 83 courses provided 66,180 hours of service in 233 community agencies and schools throughout Santa Cruz, San Benito and Monterey counties. The monetary value of this service, calculated using the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service, totals \$1,743,181.

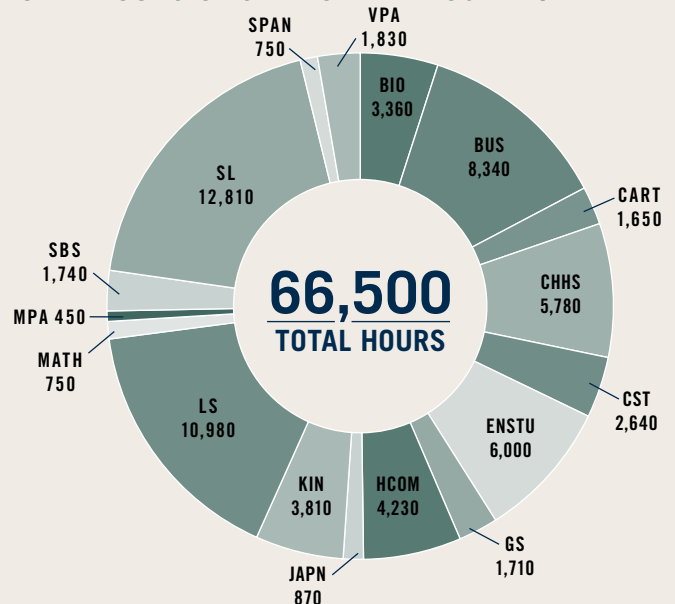
