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 Service Learning Institute

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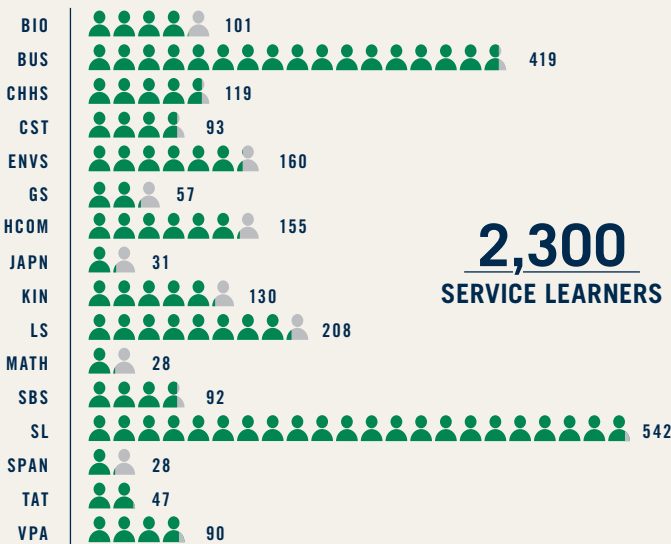
The mission of CSU Monterey Bay's Service Learning Institute is to foster and promote social justice by cultivating reciprocal service and learning partnerships among CSUMB students, faculty, staff and the surrounding tri-county community.

During the 2012-2013 academic year 2,300 students in 106 courses provided 70,510 hours of service in 276 community agencies and schools throughout Santa Cruz, San Benito and Monterey counties. The monetary value of this service, calculated using the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service, totals \$1,561,091.

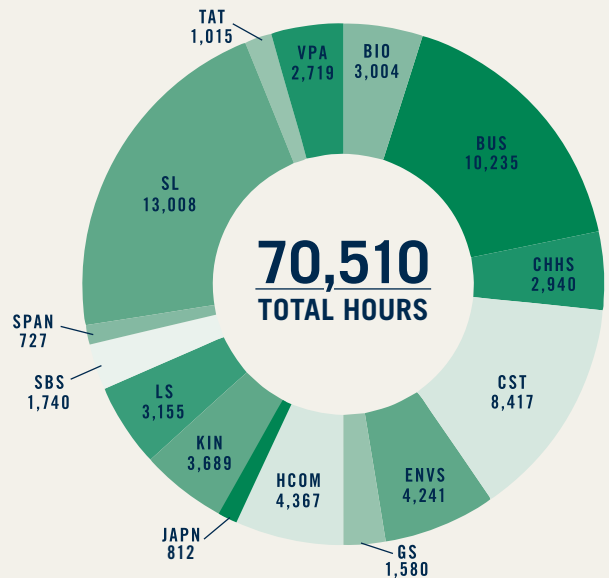
