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The mission of CSU Monterey Bay's Service Learning Institute is to foster and promote social justice by cultivating reciprocal service and learning partnerships among CSUMB students, faculty, staff and the surrounding tri-county community.

During the 2011-2012 academic year, 2238 students in 95 service-designated courses provided 68,390 hours of service in 180 community agencies and schools throughout Santa Cruz, Monterey and San Benito counties. The monetary value of this service, calculated using the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service (National Value of time per hour of \$21.79) equals \$1,490,218.

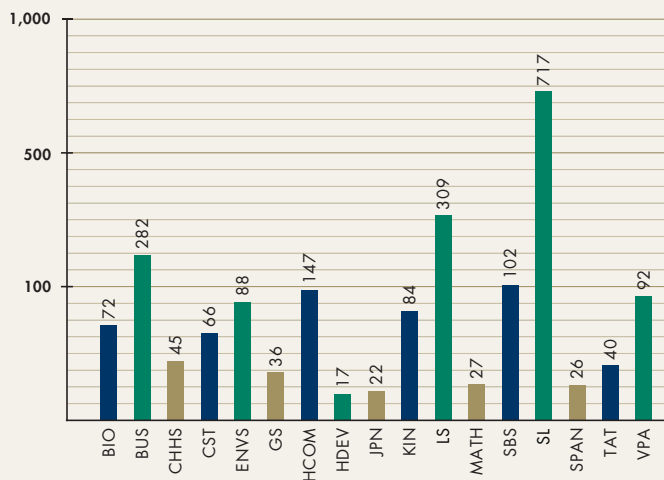

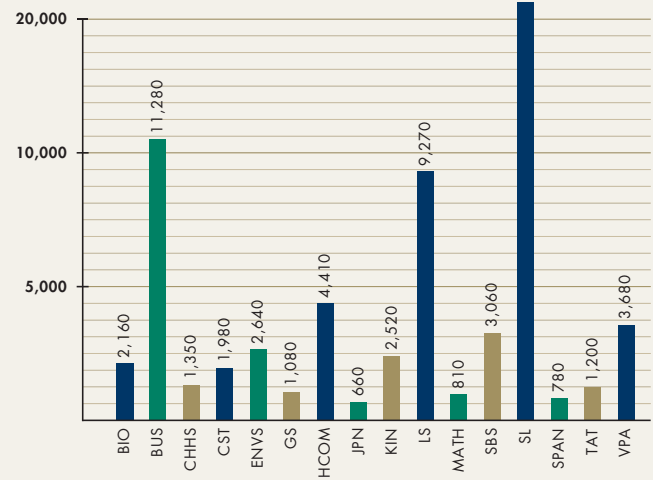
