## SERVICE LEARNING QUICK FACTS



CSU Monterey Bay's Service Learning Institute fosters and promotes social justice by cultivating reciprocal service and learning partnerships among CSUMB students, faculty, staff and the surrounding tri-county community.

During the 2009 – 2010 academic year, **1851 students** in 54 courses provided **59,920 hours of service** in community agencies and schools. Students were placed in 166 community partners in Fall 2009 and 149 community partners in Spring 2010. **The monetary value of this service to the community, calculated with the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service, totals \$1,249,332.**




