SERVICE LEARNING QUICK FACTS 2014-2015

The mission of CSU Monterey Bay's Service Learning Institute is to foster and promote social justice by cultivating reciprocal service and learning partnerships among CSUMB students, faculty, staff and the surrounding tri-county community.

During the 2014-2015 academic year 2,753 students in 114 courses provided 85,800 hours of service in 275 community agencies and schools throughout Santa Cruz, San Benito and Monterey counties. The monetary value of this service, calculated using the Independent Sector Value of Community and Volunteer Service, totals \$1,899,815.

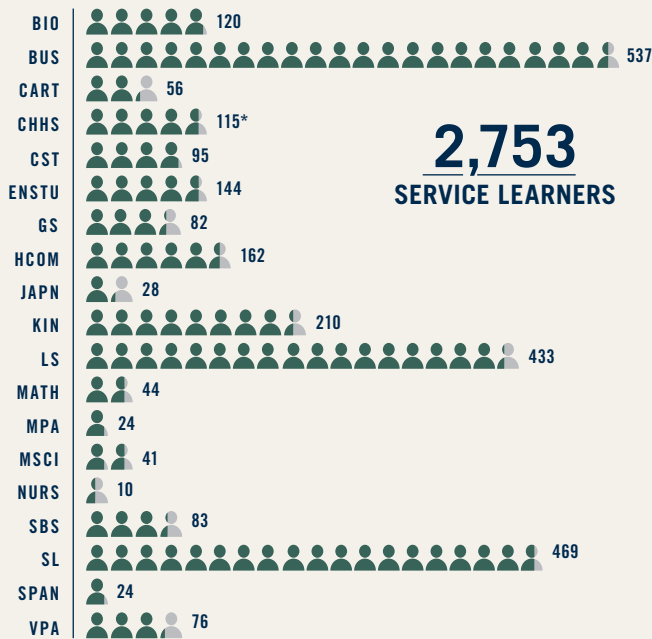

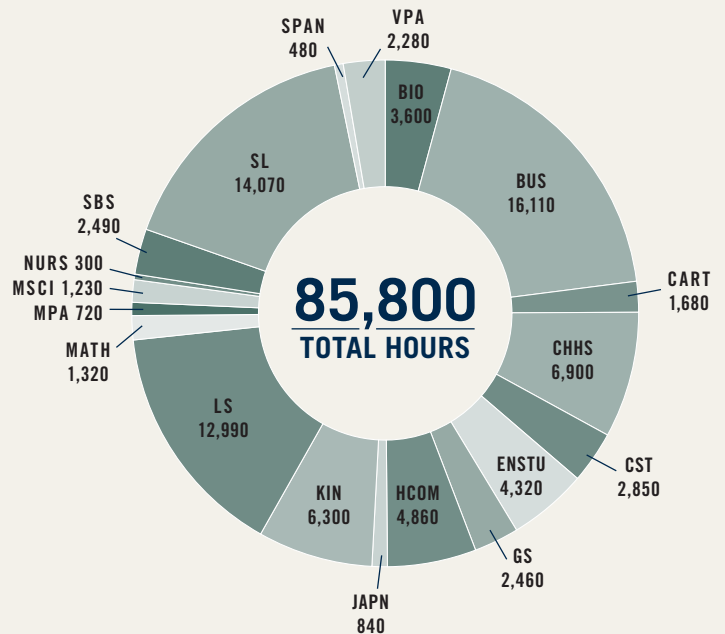
